

# W. P. A. PROJECTS

The work on W. P. A. Projects was resumed on December 29, 1937. Six men were assigned to Hampden, and increased to 12 men after the First of February.

The Chapin Road was the first project of 1938. This road has been put in good condition for hardening for approximately ½ mile. The road has been widened, banks sloped, gutters constructed and gravelled.

The North Monson Road was started during May and is now the best and most travelled road going east. This road was widened, culverts widened and well gravelled.

After the hurricane of Sept 21, under a project "Flood and Storm Damage Reconstruction" the W. P. A. assigned 20 men and 2 trucks for this work.

The work consisted of removing all fallen trees from the highways and trees that fell from public ground onto private ways; removing debris, brush and burning; cleaning culverts, removing stumps and the gravelling of washouts in the roads.

Approximately 210 trees were removed, 40 stumps, and hanging or broken limbs were removed from 250 trees. All the stumps have not been removed as the emergency work was terminated on Dec. 20.

Eleven men were assigned to a new project, "The Improving of the Back Roads of the Town" and are now working on the South Road toward the Connecticut State Line.

In order to continue the W. P. A. Projects, the Town will have to make an appropriation therefor.

# State Auditor's Report

Sir:

As directed by you I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Hampden for the period from March 15, 1936, the date of the previous audit, to October 15, 1938, and submit the following report thereon:

The financial transactions, as recorded on the books of the several departments collecting or disbursing money for the town or committing bills for collection, were examined, checked, and verified,

The books and accounts of the bookkeeper were examined and checked in detail. The recorded receipts were checked with the records of the departments collecting money for the town or committing bills for the collection of money due the town and with the treasurer's cash book, while the payments were compared with the treasury warrants approved by the selectmen.

The appropriations voted by the town were listed from the town clerk's record of town meetings and were checked with the appropriation ledger accounts. A comparison of the appropriations voted with the aggregate amounts chargeable against each appropriation showed that a number of accounts were overdrawn. In this connection attention is called to the provisions of Section 31, Chapter 44, General Laws, which prohibits the incurring of liabilities in excess of the appropriations voted.

In connection with expenditures for Chapter 81 and 90 highway projects, attention is called to the fact that such expenditures may not exceed the aggregate amount of the appropriations voted by the town, together with the amounts actually received on account of allotments. Whenever the reimbursements from the State and County are not received in time to provide funds for the payment of pay-rolls, etc., temporary loans under the provisions of Section 6A, Chapter 44, General Laws, may be issued by the treasurer.

The ledger accounts were analyzed, the necessary adjustments resulting from the audit were made, a trial balance was taken off, and a balance sheet, showing the financial condition of the town on October 15, 1988, was prepared and is appended to this report.

The books and accounts of the town treasurer were examined and checked in detail. The receipts as recorded were checked with the records of the departments collecting money for the town and with the other sources from which money was paid into the town treasury. The payments were compared with the selectmen's warrants authorizing the treasurer to disburse town funds. The addition of the cash book was verified and the cash balance October 15, 1938, was proved by a reconciliation of the bank balance with a statement received from the bank and by actual count of the cash on hand.

The payments of interest and debt were proved by a comparison with the amounts falling due and with the cancelled securities on file. The savings bank books representing the investment of the trust funds in the custody of the treasurer were examined and listed, the income being proved and the expenditures verified.

The books and accounts of the tax collector were examined and checked in detail. The taxes outstanding at the time of the previous examination were audited and proved and all subsequent commitment lists of poll, property, and motor vehicle excise taxes were added and reconciled with the warrants given by the assessors for their collection. The collections as recorded on the cash books were checked with the commitment lists, and the payments to the treasurer were verified. The abatements were compared with the assessors' record of abatements granted, and the outstanding accounts were listed and proved with the bookkeeper's ledger.

Verification of the outstanding accounts was obtained by mailing notices to a number of persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town, the replies received thereto indicating that the accounts as listed are correct.

The collector's cash on hand October 15, 1938, was proved by actual count.

The financial transactions of the town clerk were examined. The recorded receipts for dog and sporting licenses were checked with the record of licenses issued and the payments to the State and the town treasurer were verified. The town clerk's cash on hand October 15, 1938, was proved by actual count.

The surety bonds of the town clerk, treasurer and tax collector were examined and found to be in proper form.

The receipts for licenses issued by the board of selectmen were checked with the record of licenses granted and the payments to the treasurer were verified, The surety bonds filed with the town by individuals to whom liquor licenses were granted were examined and found to be in proper form,

The receipts for town hall rents were checked with the record of hall rentals and the payments to the treasurer were verified.

The accounts of the sealer of weights and measures were examined. The recorded receipts were checked with the record of fees charged, the payments to the treasurer were verified, and the cash on hand October 15, 1938, was verified.

The records of the dental clinic were examined. The charges were listed, and collections were compared with the payments to the treasurer, and the outstanding accounts were listed and proved.

The records of accounts receivable of the public welfare department were examined. The charges for aid rendered were examined and listed, the collections and disallowances were checked, and the outstanding accounts were listed and proved with the bookkeeper's ledger.

There are appended to this report, in addition to the balance sheet, tables showing a reconciliation of the treasurer's cash, summaries of the tax and departmental accounts, together with tables showing the trust fund transactions.

For the cooperation received from all town officials during the progress of the audit, I wish, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, to express appreciation.

# Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the School Committee of Hampden:

I am privileged to submit herewith my second annual report.

# School Attendance and School Costs

The growth in the elementary school enrolment of Hampden, commented upon in the report last year as being exceptional to prevailing tendencies throughout the state and the nation, has continued during 1938. In December our membership reached 153 pupils, the largest number in the recent history of the town. The number of Hampden pupils in high and trade schools is 41. Although this figure is slightly lower than in 1933, 1934, and 1935, the total number of pupils attending elementary, high and trade schools in December, 1938, was 194, a new high point in school attendance for the town in recent years.

It is worthy of note that Hampden's school expense is increasing less rapidly than the school enrolment. Five years ago (1934) our total school membership, elementary, high, and trade school, was 169. In December, 1938, it had grown to 194, an increase of 15 per cent. The amount appropriated for school support in 1934 was \$19,726. The amount needed for school support in 1939, as set forth by the school committee, is \$21,000, an increase of 6 per cent over the figure for 1934.

In considering school costs, it should be borne in mind that our high school tuition rate was increased \$10 per pupil beginning February, 1938, the tuition in junior high now being \$140 per pupil and in senior high \$170 per pupil. The trade school tuition rates remain the same, at \$150 per pupil.

The per capita cost of elementary schools in Hampden for the school year 1937-38, as shown in the last annual report of the State Department of Education, was \$80.85. This may be compared with the cost in 124 towns classed with Hampden, which was \$80.65.

With reference to the division of the amount expended by the state and local community for the education of both elementary and high school pupils, attention is again called to the figures issued by the State Department of Education. For the fiscal year ending December 31, 1937, Hampden paid from local taxation per pupil \$50.08. Hampden received from the state as reimbursement on account of schools \$56.22 per pupil.

# The School Curriculum

The program for the introduction of new textbooks adopted last year has been carried forward according to schedule. All of the new books in use are accompanied by teachers' manuals and helps. These new texts and the teaching guides are of much assistance to supervisors and teachers in their endeavor to keep the curriculum of the schools in harmony with the needs of the times.

# Arithmetic

The results of the standardized tests given in April, 1983, brought out the fact that our pupils fell below the test standards in arithmetic. Though they approach the standard in the manipulation of figures or in the fundamental skills of arithmetic, they are notably below the standard in the application of those skills in problem work.

In view of the fact that our arithmetic textbooks had been in use for some time, a committee of ten teachers representing the three towns was chosen to cooperate with the superintendent in studying aims, content, and methods in arithmetic, as well as recent textbooks in this subject.

As a result of the investigations of this committee, a new series of arithmetics known as The Arithmetics by Knight, Studebaker, Ruch, and Findley was adopted and brought into use with the opening of the current school year. One of the main purposes of these new books is to give children a better understanding of life situations which involve number relationships as well as to give them an abundance of practice in the solving of problems growing out of such situations. Another commendable feature of the new books is a plan whereby each pupil is provided at regular intervals with a means of diagnosing and correcting his own weaknesses in arithmetic as well as a means of measuring his progress in each phase of arithmetical work. It is hoped that through the use of these new textbooks, new course of study in arithmetic, and new emphasis by teachers, our pupils will reach a high standard in their work in problem solving as well as in their mastery of the fundamental skills.

# Handwriting

Within recent years there has been a growing feeling in this and other communities that the results of
handwriting instruction have not been commensurate
with the amount of time devoted to such instruction.
Quite possibly too much time has been spent in armmovement exercises and too little in the practice of
letter formation. The degree of skill that has been
developed in handwriting exercises has not been satis-

factorily transferred to the written work in other subjects. It may also be said that such skill in handwriting as has been developed in the elementary grades has not been satisfactorily retained after pupils leave the elementary school.

Mr. William L. Rinehart, who with his staff supervises handwriting in the public schools of a score or more of cities and towns in Massachusetts, was invited to appear before the joint committee of this superintendency union at its annual meeting in April, 1938. Thereafter the superintendent was instructed to examine the handwriting results being obtained in Fitchburg, where Mr. Rinehart's system was in use. The committees of the three towns of the union were so favorably impressed with the results described and observed that Mr. Rinehart was employed to supervise the handwriting in the school of the union beginning at the opening of the school year 1938-39. Hampden's share of the cost of such supervision for the first year is \$125.

During this year the schools are receiving full supervisory service from Mr. Rinehart and his staff, each classroom being visited once a month, the class being tested as to its progress both through the handwriting lesson and through examination of the written work in language, spelling, and other subjects. All teachers in the union meet together once each month, when Mr. Rinehart discusses the problems that arise in teaching and sets forth the work of each grade for the ensuing month.

During the first year of Mr. Rinehart's service it is expected that the teachers will become well versed in the use of the Functional Method of Handwriting. In subsequent years it is planned to have a limited supervisory service by Mr. Rinehart, whereby in a teachers' meeting at the beginning of the school year he will set forth an outline of the year's work and thereafter will score samples of pupils' handwriting sent him monthly by all the teachers. Mr. Rinehart will supply the specialized materials needed. This limited supervisory service will cost little more than has been expended for handwriting materials in past years.

Functional Handwriting is a combination of the arm and finger movements. The finger movement is used chiefly in making the small letters, and the arm movement in making the capitals and the swing from one letter to another. In beginning his training in handwriting the child has his attention directed at first to letter formation. Speed, of little importance at the outset, is acquired naturally with practice. Much of the drill work is rhythmic and may be set to a musical accompaniment. Emphasis is placed upon the value of the monthly diagnosis of each pupil's work, using the following criteria: Neatness, legibility, proportionate size of letters, alignment, spacing, slant, endings.

It is felt that the Functional Method of Handwriting is based upon sound principles of pedagogy and that Mr. Rinehart is particularly well-qualified by natural talent, advanced study, and experience to train teachers and pupils in its use.

# Visual Aids in Teaching

School authorities are rapidly coming to appreciate the value of visual aids in the education of children. Photographic drawings, paintings, stereoscopic views, lantern slides, silent motion pictures, and sound motion pictures are in turn coming into frequent use in the schools. Through recent experimentation in the use of motion pictures as an aid in education, it has been found that pupils with the help of such aid learn more concerning a given subject and learn it in less time than they do without such helps,

One of the worthiest efforts thus far made in the development of educational motion pictures is "The Chronicles of America Photoplays" prepared and distributed by the Yale University Press. These photoplays set forth in dramatic fashion the most striking episodes in American history from the period of discovery and colonization through the Civil War. The producers of these photoplays have made an earnest effort to reproduce faithfully the costumes and scenery as well as the story itself.

Through cooperation with other towns on a circuit, it has been possible for Hampden to have these fifteen photoplays during the school year 1938-39 at a cost of eighteen dollars for rentals of films. The pictures are being shown at intervals of two or three weeks from September to May. The pupils appear not only to enjoy these pictures but to profit by them in their study of American history. The teachers and janitors have cooperated generously in making the necessary arrangements. Indeed, our experience with these pictures strongly indicates that we should be prepared to make regular use of the motion picture as an aid in teaching such subjects as history, geography, current events, elementary science, and health education.

# Professional Meetings

A substantial number of our teachers are taking courses or are planning to take courses for the purpose of sustaining their professional interests and improving their professional qualifications.

Wilbraham, The Pines School: Address by Miss Ellen Morrissey, Principal Elias Brookings School, Springfield, "Teaching of Reading".

Pleasant View School, East Longmeadow: Dr. Mary Elliff, Elson-Gray Reading System, "Problems in Primary Reading."

Hampden Consolidated School: Mr. Hugh Nixon, Secretary Massachusetts Teachers' Federation, "Horace Mann."

Wilbraham, The Pines School: Dr. Raymond G. Drewry, Springfield College, "Elementary Education—A Look Into the Future,"

# Repairs and Improvements in School Equipment

Fortunately for Hampden no serious damage to the school building resulted from the hurricane and flood. Through the vigilance of Mr. Perkins and the assistance of members of the fire department, the boiler room was kept sufficiently free from water to prevent damage to the oil burner. The loss of electricity however, occasioned by the hurricane proved to be a serious handicap in the use of the building for school purposes, inasmuch as the oil burner, pressure tank, and the pump are operated by electric current. Through the prompt action of the school officials, two auxiliary gasoline motors were leased to help tide over the emergency. Friends of the school were also kind enough to loan portable oil stoves which proved to be adequate to remove the chill from the classrooms in the morning. Through the adoption of these emergency measures, the loss of school time was cut down to three days. Through the adoption of the new calendar, it will appear that two of these three days will be made up by the close of the school year.

In view of the fact that any circumstance which may arise to deprive the building of electric current seriously handicaps its use for school purposes, it seemed wise to the school committee and to the selectmen to purchase one of the auxiliary motors that was rented following the hurricane. We are, therefore, no longer wholly dependent upon electricity to keep the boiler room free of water and to keep pressure in the water tank.

For the use of parents, school officials, teachers, and supervisors, it was decided that a telephone should be installed in the principal's room. The value of this installation has already proved itself in many ways.

Due to the increased enrolment of the school, it was found necessary to purchase five additional desks and chairs for Miss Fox's room and two for Miss Slight's room. One new table has been constructed by Mr. Perkins to enlarge the capacity of the lunch room.

Six classroom maps have been purchased in order to meet the needs of geography study in grades 4 to 8 inclusive.

A new wire-reinforced door mat has been supplied for the side entrance, and the needed repairs made on the tile work in the boys' lavatory and the lavatory in the teachers' room.

# School Calendar

In view of the fact that the transportation service of high school pupils is so intimately related to that of elementary school pupils, and in view of the further fact that nearly all of our elementary school pupils eventually enter the Springfield schools, it has been thought desirable to have the school year in Hampden coincide with the school year in Springfield. The four terms of the elementary schools, therefore, open and close on the same days as the Springfield schools. This brings about two changes. The fall term opens on Wednesday after Labor Day rather than on Tuesday as formerly, and the summer term closes on Friday noon of the last week of school rather than on Tuesday afternoon.

# The Operetta

The Consolidated School presented its third operetta, "An Old Kentucky Garden," on May 19 and 20, 1938. This operetta, based on the works of the famous composer, Stephen C. Foster, preserved the delightful simplicity and purity of the Foster originals. Thus, the memorizing of the many solo and chorus numbers was of permanent value to the participants.

The scenery and stage properties were made largely in the art classes. The local Volunteer Fire Department very kindly loaned the school an appropriate backdrop. Many residents of the town also contributed to the success of the operetta by loaning old-time costumes reminiscent of the 1850's.

It was remarked by many that the operettas grow better year by year and that the presentation of "An Old Kentucky Garden" was superlative in every particular.

The net income to the school amounted to \$63.32. A portion of this has been invested in a typewriter, which will be very useful to the teachers in preparing notices, programs, and mimeograph copies of materials for class use.

# Tuberculosis Clinic

For some time past, and at intervals of three or four years, the Hampden County Tuberculosis Association has conducted clinics in Hampden as well as other towns of the county for the examination of school children. Such a clinic was held in March, 1938. The written consent of parents was secured in all cases before children were tested. The Von Pirquet test was given to 107, or 81 per cent of the school enrolment. Of these, 9, or 8 per cent, showed some reaction. 10 children were X-rayed. Of these, 4 were selected for further examination. This group of 4 pupils will receive an annual check-up by the Hampden County Tuberculosis Association. It was very gratifying indeed that the clinic did not discover one active case of tuberculosis in the 107. This service periodically rendered by the Hampden County Tuberculosis Association is of great value to the community and much appreciated.

# American Education Week

Following the plan tried for the first time last year, an evening session was held on Monday, November 7, from 7 to 9 o'clock, in observance of American Education Week. The first hour was devoted to an exposition of the work being done in the field of art education under the direction of Mrs. Tower. Each of the grades in the school gave one or more special exercises illustrating its activities in art work. There was also on exhibition various products of the art education program extending from the most elementary work through to that of the eighth grade. Mrs. Tower and the teachers were highly commended for the wide variety and the high quality of the work being accomplished. During the second hour of the program the people were introduced to the type of visual education rapidly coming into use. The film "Peter Stuyvesant," one of the Chronicles of America Photoplays, was shown. This was followed by a showing of a motion picture of the first-grade children taken on the opening day of school. The attendance at the evening session was very large, all seats in the auditorium being occupied and many standing.

# Parent-Teacher Association

As a result of new expressions of interest in the possible formation of a Parent-Teacher organization, an open meeting for the discussion of this matter was held at the Town House on November 21. Mrs. Myrabel G. Fiske, Field Agent of the Massachusetts Parent-Teacher Association for the western part of the state, was present. It was decided to form such an organization for Hampden, a constitution was approved, and the following slate of officers chosen: President, Mrs. Lucy E. Connors; Vice President, Ben F. Libby; Recording Secretary, Mrs. Lora N. Willey; Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Eleanor B. Parsons; Treasurer, Mrs. Blanche J. Lemon.

It is believed that a live Parent-Teacher association can accomplish a great deal in bringing about — (1) A better understanding on the part of parents of the purpose of the school; (2) A better knowledge on the part of parents as to child nature and the laws of its development; and (3) A better understanding of the children on the part of the teachers through more intimate contacts with parents and homes. It is also believed that the Parent-Teacher association can be a potent unifying force in the community in its efforts to provide to the children educational opportunities of a high quality.

I wish to call attention to the following reports submitted by various staff members, including that of the school nurse, school physician, and school dentist. Report of the School Dentist

# Report of School Physician and School Nurse

Following is a statistical report of the work of the school physician and the school nurse:

At the time physical examinations were given, 50 parents accepted the invitation to be present and were given an opportunity to consult with the school physician about any defects found in their children, Literature prepared by the State Department of Public Health was distributed. Among the results of the physical examinations were the following: 16 pupils were found to have poor posture, 17 showed improvement in this respect as compared with previous years:

84 pupils had not received dental attention at the time of the physical examinations,—many of these were later given such attention at the dental clinic and by family dentists. 40 pupils were found with defective tonsils; 17 of these have had the corrective work done, the arrangements for 8 having been made by the school nurse. With respect to flat feet, 13 pupils showed improvement, but 12 were found who still need attention.

In April 127 children were weighed. Of these, 83 were rated A and 11 D. In September 148 were weighed. Of these, 79 were rated A and 11 D, 7 had not gained, 14 were found to have lost weight.

Thirteen pupils have been taken by the nurse to the oculist in Springfield. Glasses were prescribed in nine cases. In other cases certain exercises were recommended to correct muscular defects.

In the fall the eyes of seven children were reexamined by the school nurse and notices of defect sent in five instances.

During the summer five children were the guests of Camp Frederic Edwards, remaining from twenty-six to fifty-four days, gaining in weight from one and one-half pounds to six and one-half pounds, and making a total gain of seventeen and one-quarter pounds. These children profited very much from their vacation. The rest periods, proper diet, plenty of sunshine, sympathetic supervision all contributed to their welfare.

The work of the year has necessitated 161 visits by the school nurse to schools, homes, doctors, and others, and 192 consultations with parents, teachers, pupils, and others. Without the cooperation of teachers, school committee, selectmen, and our superintendent, this would be impossbile. We thank you.

# Town Warrant

#### COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS

To ARTHUR H. GERRISH.

Constable of the Town of Hampden:

#### GREETING:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town who are qualified to vote in Town Affairs and Elections, to meet at the Town House on Monday, the sixth day of February, A. D. 1939, at 10 o'clock in the forencon, then and there to act on the following articles:

Article 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2. To choose a Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, three Selectmen who shall be the Board of Public Welfare, one Collector of Taxes, three Constables, one Tree Warden, one Auditor—all for the term of one year; also one School Committee, one Cemetery Commissioner, one Assessor and one Library Trustee — all for the term of three years; and one member of the planning board for the term of five years. All to be on one ballot. Also to choose all other necessary Town Officers. The polls open at 10:15 A. M. and may close at 6 P. M.

- Article 3. To hear the annual reports of all officers of the Town and any committee whose duty it may be to report at said meeting and act thereon.
- Article 4. To fix the compensation of all officers of the Town, in accordance with Section 8, Chap. 591, Acts of 1920; and also all other employees of the Town.
- Article 5. To see what disposition the Town will make of the Dog Fund, now in the hands of the Treasurer.
- Article 6. To see if the Town will appoint an agent or agents to institute or prosecute or defend suits and actions at law to which the Town may be a party.
- Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to prescribe the manner of giving notice of town meetings by specifying the number of places where warrants shall be posted.
- Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$597.09 for Street Lights.
- Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to be expended in the Town by the Hampden County Trustees for Aid to Agriculture, in accordance with the provisions of the laws of the Commonwealth.
- Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,550.00 for the repair and maintenance of Town Roads, and instruct the Selectmen to petition and contract with the Commissioners of the Department of Public Works, under the provisions of Chapter 81, Sec. 28 of the General Laws.
- Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the improvement of Glendale Road, said money to be used in conjunction with any money which may be allotted by the State or County, or both, for this purpose; or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the widening of Main Street, said money to be used in conjunction with any money which may be allotted by the State or County, or both, for this purpose; or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00, for drainage of the hill on South Road.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300,00, to be used in conjunction with any money which may be allotted by the State or County, or both, for Chapter 90 Maintenance, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the widening and surfacing a part of Chapin Road.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the widening and surfacing of North Road.

Article 17. To see what action the Town will take in regard to purchasing a lot on which to erect a town garage and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

Article 18. To see what action the Town will take in regard to erecting a town garage and appropriate a sum of money from the Property Sale Account or take any other action thereto.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,750.00 from the Road Machinery Fund to the Road Machinery Account,

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to reimburse the Hampden Volunteer Fire Company the sum of \$232.00, expended by them for a fire escape and fire-proof stairway, and raise and appropriate the same.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the care and maintenance of the Fire Truck.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125.00 for Forest Fire Equipment.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to change the time of the business part of the Annual Town Meeting from the present day session to an evening session, such meeting to be held not later than one week from the date of the annual election.

Article 24. To see if the Town will accept as a public street the roadway as it now exists running Westerly from Allen Street past the property of Lionel J. Morin and others.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to have the Selectmen and Town Clerk prepare a set of by-laws for the town, to be presented at the next Annual Meeting for action thereon and make an appropriation therefor.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for replacing trees destroyed by the hurricane, on Main Street.

Article 27. To see what action the Town will take in regard to continuing the Pre-School Well Child Clinic and raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 therefor.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for WPA projects for 1939.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$280.48 for Gypsy Moth Control.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,00 for Tent Caterpillar Control.

Article 31 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the maintenance of a Dental Clinic, in accordance with provisions of Section 50, Chapter 111, General Laws, or take any action relative thereto.

Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money in accordance with Chapter 218, Acts of 1920, an act relative to the care of Soldiers and Sailors Graves.

Article 33. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1939, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing with Section 17, Chapter 44, General Laws.

Article 34. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and carry into effect any vote or votes passed under the preceding articles; and to appropriate the same, also how such money shall be raised.

And you are directed to serve this warrant by posting an attested copy thereof at each of the three places designated by the Town. Hereof fail not, and make due return of this warrant, with your doings thereon, to the Town Clerk, at or before the time of meeting aforesaid. 
