Fourth Annual TOWN REPORT Cover Contest...sponsored by the Hampden Arts Lottery Council


Open to all students in the Art Department, Thornton Burgess School, under the direction of Ms. Susan Haller, Art Instructor, Hampden Schools.


FIRST PRIZE... Colin Schmitt, Grade 6, Age 11






HONORABLE MENTION - Antoine Durand - Grade 8, Age 14






HONORABLE MENTION - Paul Root - Grade 5, Age 10

Son of Eileen and Gerald Root



REPORT OF BOARD OF SELECTMEN

Each year your Board of Selectmen submits its yearly review for the Annual Report, consisting of any specialized projects, activities, normal weekly concerns, as well as future items for the Town of Hampden.

Currently, for this Town Meeting and Election, voters of Hampden will be asked to approve an article for refurbishing of the Green Meadows Elementary School, Town House, Town Garage and purchase a Town heavy duty dump truck.

This must be voted at the Annual Town Meeting under the Special Articles, as well as at the Annual Town Election as a referendum question.

Your Board will also ask at the Annual Town Meeting to have the article approved, establishing a standing Capital Needs Committee to work on immediate and long-range forecasting of capital outlays which might be required in the Town of Hampden.

We want to stress that the Town of Hampden is healthy and running well, with no debt and would prefer this position, if possible. However, there are needs that have to be addressed and we solicit the aid of the Townspeople in supporting the Board of Selectmen Town Meeting articles.

Throughout the past year, Hampden has received a substantial amount of aid - mostly 100% reimbursement for specific improvements in the Town. The improvements accomplished are, first, the Salt Shed at the Hampden Town Garage Facility which provides for complete indoor storage and containment of salt for road purposes. (Not only is it a very sound structure but it tends to be as aesthetic as possible for a building of this type).

We'd also like to call to the attention of the Townspeople the general improvements made at the Town Garage FAcility and give thanks to Dana Pixley, the Town Highway Superintendent.

Our second project was the bridge across the Scantic River on Rock-A-Dundee Road. The bridge was installed in a short period of time and allows for major vehicles to have access to the Rock-A-Dundee area and no sacrifice to the aesthetics and country setting of the area was made. The replacement bridge blended very well and the project was 100% reimbursement.

The third project was for the Allen Street/Somers Road intersection which was finally approved but actually too late for the summer construction period. Not wanting to have the intersection torn up in the Fall when traffic definitely would be heavier, in the Spring we will plan to install the necessary drains and prepare the general area, without disturbing the road surface, and, then, finish the project during the Summer.

BOARD OF SELECTMEN P

The Board of Selectmen has voted to move the official polling place to the Hampden Town Hall. It was at the Green Meadows School for a year.

Hopefully, this will be more accessible to the Townspeople and we have installed the new handicapped access ramp at the front door.

Cable TV has been an interest point for many of the Townspeople. Since the cable contract was signed some years ago, the Board of Selectmen maintained a continous discussion with the Cable Company to increase the service within the community. We had much success in having the cable installed in two areas which had direct burial services and we did not want to go overhead cable. This was a private endeavor and worked out well and serviced many citizens in the Town.

Our next effort is to extend the service in the east side of Town. This year, we've had good response from the Cable Company. Hopefully, by the end of the Spring, most of the Scantic Road, Bennett Road and Glendale Road areas will be covered. We have been advised that the following year the balance of the Town will be done. As always, there is no guarantee but we feel confident that this will occur.

Changes were made in the lighting for our monument in the Town Common.

This year the Board of Selectmen sponsored the Tree Lighting Ceremony to open the Christmas Season. It was well attended and the Centennial Choir and Scout organizations assisted. Santa Claus was in attendance as well, and for those that might have missed this function, we will plan to do the same thing next year and will have more activities for the younger participants.

The Board of Selectmen meets every Monday night at 7 o'clock. We welcome all to attend, to pose questions, assist in the discussion or just as a point of general interest. During the year, we make every effort to meet with the other Boards and Committees in Town, to provide as much communication and support as needed and make every effort to make ourselves available, not only during the meeting time, but at other times during the week so it is most convenient for all.

BOARD OF HEALTH REPORT

The Hampden Board of Health has spent an active and challenging year promoting the various activities which maintain a good quality of life for the residents of our town. Because of increased guidelines and regulations from both the federal and state levels, our activities and record keeping have expanded and will continue to do so. The sudden death of our Clerk, Dianne Toulson, was a tragic loss for both the Board and the town.

The offer of a low cost coliform test of well water has now become an annual event. The reaction of our residents has been appreciative; most being reassured of excellent drinking water. When a problem has been discovered, our Board of Health Agent has provided guidance and helped work out solutions. We are happy to help with suggestions at other times of the year also. If you have a problem with your well, feel free to call the Board of Health.

In order to have more accurate tests, the town has restricted its percolation season to the Spring weeks from March 1 to May 15 for planned reconstruction and new home septic systems. We are always available to work with residents when an emergency arises.

Each Fall the town sponsors a flu clinic. We encourage those with chronic illness and the elderly to participate. 180 residents took advantage of this service in 1987. We would like to thank Dr. J. Hebert and nurses Jane McCarthy, Bea Moriarty, and Judy Hatch who volunteered their time to this project.

The Right to Know program keeps this office busy with extensive record keeping. Board member John Flynn held training sessions this year for all town employees affected.

Since there were no bids for the maintenance of the Sanitary Landfill, the town has undertaken the running of this operation. We have continued this service with as little change as possible. The future of our landfill, as we know it now, is limited. We are looking toward recycling paper, glass and plastic in the future. We have started a metal recycling plan this year. Plans for a household hazardous waste disposal day are in the works and we are working on plans to address the disposal of brush and leaves. As these and other changes take place we ask the townspeople for their continued cooperation in supporting a clean and efficient disposal system.

REPORT OF THE TOWN MODERATOR

Will it be necessary to override proposition 2½? This has been an issue at the last two Annual Town Meetings. This year, barring unforeseen circumstances, you will be asked to support an override via an article in the warrant. This override will be for capital expenditures to do extensive repairs and remodeling to the Green Meadows School and the Town House.

Last year the Selectmen appointed a committee whose function was, in part, to study the needed immediate and short range capital expenditures of the Town. Input was requested from all boards and committees with responsibilities for major capital assets. This committee, in conjuction with the Selectmen, was to determine those areas most in need of immediate attention and recommend the most practical solution.

What does this mean to the townspeople of Hampden? The override if passed at the Annual Town Meeting must also be passed by majority vote at a special election held for this purpose before it can become effective. If passed, the cost is added to the tax levy only until the debt is paid.

It would be improper for me, as Moderator, to be for or against any issue contained in an article appearing in the warrant. However, nothing precludes me from commenting on this committee.

The committee, appointed by the Selectmen, is made up of townspeople, also voters, of the Town of Hampden. They were selected because of a particular talent and expertise in a required field. They have donated many hours of their time to benefit the citizens of this community. Whether we agree or disagree with their recommendations does not detract from their dedication. They are an extension of the appointing authority and, as such, worked within the perimeters dictated by this authority. Let's let them know at Town Meeting just how much we appreciate their efforts.

A final thought: Wouldn't it be nice if this committee stayed in existence, and projected our capital expenditures and a timetable for action for the next five to ten years? We may avoid some future surprises. The Master Plan Committee, now in existence, would welcome this input.

In 1987 the Board of Registrars gladly accepted the appointment of Hal Miller as Assistant Registrar of Voters at Minnechaug Regional High School. He holds special registration hours for high school students who have or are about to reach voting age. In this way we have made participation in the governmental process more accessible to our young people.

As for accessibility: Thanks to Hampden's Highway Department workers, the Town House has a cement ramp which meets state specifications to make the Town House auditorium a handicapped accessible polling location. We are grateful because we will now be able to change our voting place from Green Meadows School back to the Town House. We wish to comment that the School Committee, principal and school maintainence workers were most helpful and cooperative. We could not have asked for greater support during the time we voted at Green Meadows School

PLANNING BOARD ANNUAL REPORT

The scheduled meetings on the 2nd and 4th Wed. of each month, have involved large time demands by individuals needing zoning interpretation or actual zoning action by the Board allowing less, and often no time for general discussion and future planning.

The promise of a Master Plan Committee grew during the year, with a future goal of forming an active Planning Board Subcommittee. Such a subcommittee does research into area trends that might impact Hampden, prepares needed zoning changes for Town Meeting vote and whatever the Planning Board charges the group with.

For various reasons, the major being the daily demands of living in the complex world of the 80's, the group dwindled until the remaining volunteers, rather than quit, put a priority on developing an open space plan.

Erica Circle Extension, a residential subdivision was approved for development as was Commercial Drive, a Commercial District subdivision.

Other subdivisions being proposed are the Hampden Country Club Subdivision, off of Main St.; Hampden Heights, off of South Monson Rd.; Hampden Woods, off of Wilbraham Rd.; Glendale Estates, off of Glendale Rd.; and Grist Mill Lane, off of Mill Road.

Two new business buildings have been erected and one older building greatly enlarged. The owners have designed plans in keeping with the rural village look of Hampden.

The former Auto Body Shop on Main St. has a new tenant. The owner has purchased the site and is doing collision work. He has received a used car license from the Board of Selectmen to enable him to purchase parts at auction and allow him to sell a limited number of used cars.

In using the wording in Bylaw Section 6.7.2.4, the Board found the wording very difficult to understand and explain. Volunteer Kim Desmarias took on the task of improving the language and has also created a new section 6.7.2.5. These will go before the Annual Town Meeting, April 25, 1988 for vote by the Town.

The Veterans' Service Office not only processes applications for financial assistance but also assists in filing applications for all VA benefits which can result in bringing thousands of dollars in Federal Funds to applicants.

REPORT OF THE COUNCIL ON AGING

Hampden's senior population is now at 750 and we are in our 10th year of service from the Council on Aging. The Council works very hard to keep the goals set forward in enhancing the lives of Seniors and to help keep the frail elderly in their own homes as long as possible.

We recently received approval to hire another Senior Aide who will work at the Council on Aging office from 12 noon to 4 PM allowing us to have longer hours and more accessibility for the public. Muriel Ryan continues to work the morning hours. Both aides will be responsible for telephone referrals service, reservations, keeping records, and many other clerical duties.

Transportation remains as one of our top priorities for elders as well as for those who are handicapped. Our new driver, Fran Goebel logged 4564 rides for 93 different individuals for various needs from medical appointments and therapy, to clinics, meals, food shopping and others. Reginald Temple and Carl Hatch were again willing to substitute driving when needed. We contract with PVTA for our mini-bus and hope to have a new bus sometime in 1988.

Health Services is another top priority and we had monthly Health Clinics through the Visiting Nurse Association, monthly Foot Care Services by the nurses and podiatrist, Dr. Axton. The Mercy Hospital Hearing Van gave free hearing and hearing aid tests and the Springfield Optometrics gave free eye exams to those who were income eligible. Over 200 reservations were made for the Flu Clinic and Vivian Cole has volunteered to do monthly blood pressure checks. We also were able to help with referrals for homemakers, health aides to the Greater Springfield Senior Services as well as some of our own people.

Our <u>loan closet</u> was a big help to those who were looking for wheelchairs, canes, commodes, walker, bath chairs, etc.

Through the Greater Springfield Senior SErvices, 5586 meals were served in the Milville Room by 13 volunteers. 3408 home meals were delivered to shut-ins by seven volunteers. Janis DeGrandpre, site manager along with our "lunch bunch" celebrated their meal site's 10th anniversary this past summer with a celebration party which was appreciated by all who attended.

Surplus government cheese, powdered milk, flour, rice, cornmeal and butter was distributed to eligible families of ALL AGES three times during the year. We also handled Fuel Assistance intakes for the Valley Opportunity Council and had Hall Wentworth several times for Food Stamp signups. We ran a program for a discount on Cable TV rates and also did outreach through a grant from the Executive Office of Elder Affairs which acquaints seniors with various services offered to them.

One of the new programs started this year through the Executive Office of Elder Affairs in the SHINE program. SHINE stand for Serving the Health Information Needs of Elders. It is designed to develop a network of volunteers as health benefits counselors. Volunteers have been trained and certified and ready to help. Our volunteer is Ed Riley from East Longmeadow who has already helped several people with various problems. Ed will be at the Council on Aging

office at least once a month, more if necessary, to help anyone who may be having a problem with their health care options and coverage.

We had a variety of programs for people to participate in such as: Exercise Class, Line Dancing, a Walking Club, Oil Painting, Crochet, Quilting, and a Bowling League. An <u>Income Tax Service</u> was available through the AARP.

The Scantic Scribe <u>newsletter</u> was mailed to all Seniors in Hampden as well as to many out of town folk. The expense for this is shared between the Scantic Senior Citizens Club and the Council on Aging. It is edited by the director and collated by volunteers. The Scribe is mailed at a reduced rate through the non-profit organization--Friends of Hampden Seniors who also held several suppers, put on by Lorna Cox and many volunteers, to help raise monies for a new Senior Center.

Monthly <u>bus trips</u> were held and they went to many various places like: Alaska, Sturbridge Village, Aster Mansion in Newport, R.I., the Metropolitan and Guggenheim Museums in New York, Lake Sunapee, N.H., Hawaii, Ottawa Tulip Festival, Bingo in White River Junction, Vermont, Cape Cod Canal Cruise, Country Music Festival in Hunter Mountain, New York, Saratoga, New York and Penn. Dutch country. The trips are under the direction of Lorna Cox and Dot Pulsifer.

The Director and the Council Board members went to many informational meetings of the Mass. Association of Council on Agings, the State Directors' Association, Greater Springfield Senior Services, Area Agency on Agency Advisory Council and the Mass. Council on Aging and PVTA. There is much to learn in order to best serve the townspeople of Hampden.

The Council on Aging in cooperation with the Hampden Public Library has placed reference materials in the library for better access to the public. The material consists of information on nursing homes, day care, Medicare and Medicaid, Medicare and Medicaid claim forms, alcohol abuse, energy, food stamps, Social Security, etc. This information is free for you to take and we hope that you take advantage of this and visit the library.

Our records show that we serviced 376 (out of 750) different seniors with at least one of our programs.

Thanks to all our volunteers who have helped during the past year and to the Selectmen and Townspeople for their support.

At present the elected members of the Hampden Housing Authority are Florence E. Kirk, Chairperson, Sherwood W. Cronk, Vice Chairman and State Appointee, William J. Donnelly, Secretary, Clifford E. Attleton, Treasurer and Charles T. Schmitt, Ass't. Treasurer.

THE STAFF: Carole A. Robert, Executive Director and Rental Manager, Gary DePace, Accountant, Irving A. Morse, Sr., Maintenance Custodian, and Michael and John Voight as part-time assistants.

MEETINGS: The Authority meets on the third Vednesday of each month at 7:30 PM in the Centennial Commons Community Hall, 26 Springmeadow Lane, with intermittent special meetings when warranted. All meeting dates and time are posted on the Town House Bulletin Board according to regulations 48 hours prior to meeting time.

- TENANT'S ORGANIZATION: This group has its own officers and budget, plans its own meetings and programs throughout the year. There is always something for every one who wishes to participate. Some of the tenants also attend our meetings from time to time.
- AUTHORITY ACTIVITIES: One of our main functions is to be alert to the well-being of the tenants at all times and their various requirements, continuing the monthly water sample testings making progress in due season on the land-scaping program being alert to any revisions in the Tenant's Handbook, etc. Then there is always the process of communications with the Executive offices of Community Development in Boston. The Authority is under the direct supervision of the above unit in conjunction with our contract for 40 years, entered into in 1976, with the Dept. of Housing and Urban Development, and also in Contract for the Affirmative Fair Housing Marketing Plan.
- SECTION 8 Housing and Urban Development Brenda King and Warren Bamberg,
 Section 8 Co-ordinators from the Executive offices of Community Development,
 made their yearly spot check visiting 5 varying apartments. They were impressed with their findings. The Authority then went over a management review with them.

REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Conservation Commission is a regulatory board consisting of seven appointed volunteers who administer the Massachusetts Wetlands Protection Act within the Town of Hampden.

During 1987 the Commission held 15 meetings. Within these meetings 13 public hearings and 5 continuations were held to review and receive public input on Notices of Intent to perform work within a wetland area. Eight public meetings were conducted to review filings and make Determinations of Applicability for work proposed within the 100 foot buffer zone of a wetland area.

On site inspections were conducted for each of the above filings as well as for numerous other situations which come under the jurisdiction of the Commission such as siltations of waterways, fill placed in wetlands or flood plains, erosion of road shoulders into wetlands, possible grey water contamination of a stream, a no flow situation in Watchaug Brook, preliminary site inspections for 6 proposed developments as well as inspections of numerous lots on which perc tests were requested.

Other areas of concern were waste oil disposal, a property boundary dispute where work was proceeding under a wetlands permit, review of cutting plans, bylaw revision, and progress reports for a 1986 oil spill clean-up along with preparation of comments on the Environmental Notification Form to be filed for Allen Village. Members also attended educational seminars and hearings sponsored by D.E.Q.E. and MA Association of Conservation Commissions.

On November 1, 1987 the Wetlands REgulations were revised to add wildlife habitat as an additional interest to be protected under the Act. This inclusion did not extend the jurisdiction of conservation commissions. Thus, the regulations continue to protect unconnected wetlands and land subject to flooding only if they meet the minimal area/depth requirement of a \frac{1}{2} acre/foot with an average depth of at least 6 inches. Areas smaller than this in area or depth are not regulated leaving many local amphibian breeding areas unprotected. These temporary, small woodland ponds (vernal pools) occur as a result of spring thaws and rains. They hold water for the 8 to 12 weeks necessary for frog, toad and salamander eggs and larvae to develop. Eggs laid in permanent ponds have far less chance for survival as they become a food source for fish and other predators. The Department of Fish and Wildlife is currently developing acce ptable methods for confirming the importance of such pools as breeding habitat. Towns may choose to protect those areas that meet confirmation standards and are mapped. Persons aware of amphibian breeding ponds may bring them to the attention of the Commission.

Any citizen interested in learning more about the Commission is welcome to attend our meetings as an observer or associate member. Regular meetings are held on the second Monday of each month at 7:30 PM at the Town House.

REPORT OF THE LIBRARY- 1987

The Hampden Public Library had another successful year. All age groups in the community were provided with increased services. Attendance and circulation were strong especially in the new areas funded by grants, and in programs improved by the availability of the new children's room.

In a cooperative venture, Hampden and other area libraries are now sharing a grant made by the state for Large Print Books and Books on Tape. This has greatly increased the library's resources for Senior Citizens and others with low vision.

A second cooperative grant in 1987 made it possible for the library to improve its selection of Video Cassettes. This new collection will revolve with several other libraries.

A third grant received by Hampden alone provides for the purchase of new reference material. In the year ahead the library hopes to strengthen its reference service for children, young people and adults. The new computer and the beginnings of these reference books are now in the area made available when the children's room moved across the hall. This will be an important and exciting venture in 1988.

The new children's room was a busy place in 1987. The room made the children more comfortable and allowed for many activities. These included a Summer Reading Program with 117 children signed up and over 80 completing the reading requirements. With the help of Mrs. Elinor King the room was decorated with wild flowers and bumblebees. The theme was "Wild about Reading". At the final awards ceremony a magician performed, sponsored by the Friends of the Hampden Library.

In the fall, storyhours and classes for 3rd and 4th graders began again. In addition, another cooperative grant for children's programming provided funds for the visit of a puppeteer, a juggler and a storyteller. More live shows are planned in 1988.

The library would like to thank the Friends of the Library who this year generously bought a television, VCR, video tapes and a globe for the library. The trustees also thank its former director, Marta Willey, who has left to become the Assistant Director of the Wilbraham Public Library. She gave several years of fine leadership and will be missed.

The library trustees meet on the third Wednesday of the month.


REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

REPORT OF THE HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

The year 1987 was an extremely busy one for the Highway Department. The last winter season ended with a total of 21 storms that required the attention of the Highway Department. Several of these storms resulted in the five-man crew (Patrick Markham, Raymond Balser, Robert Kibbe, Robert Richards and Kurt Little) working around the clock to maintain the Town's 47 miles of roads.

In early Spring we began rehabilitation and reconstruction projects. The first rehabilitation project was to prepare a construction site on the East side of the Town Garage to accommodate a 61' diameter dome structure. The Town received a salt shed free of charge from the State. This \$80,000.00 conical building enables the Highway Department to properly store bulk rock salt within the guidelines of the D.E.Q.E.

Hampden also received a grant from the State's "Small Bridge Repair Program" in the amount of \$40,000.00 for the reconstruction of the Rock-A-Dundee Road Bridge. The old plank bridge which was installed in 1936 was replaced with pre-cast box culverts. This was necessitated by the fact that the bridge's wooden underpinning had rotted and was no longer rated to support the weight of a large truck such as the Town's fire trucks. The project now completed makes this area much safer for traffic flow and easier to maintain.

A 2,000' section of North Road was reconstructed, complete with drainage and catch basins. The old road was improved with a gravel base, graded, and surfaced with asphalt and peastone. Additional drainage was installed on North Road in two separate areas. The first was a 400' drain line that ended in a basin at the bottom of Mountain Road, alleviating a problem in that area. The second was a 750' drain line with two basins which will eliminate a drainage problem on the North side of the mountain. Catch basins were added to areas on Sessions Drive and Mountain View Drive. An old collapsed drain line was replaced on Main Street leading from Big Brook West about 350' to a catch basin. We were also able to do additional work this year on three separate roads, due to funding made available through a State Aid Highway Transportation Bond Issue distribution. With the money made available, paving was done for a distance of 975' on Valley View Drive and 450' on Fernwood Drive. Chapin Road was extensively patched and areas leveled before the entire road was resurfaced with asphalt and peastone.

The Highway Department also assisted other groups and organizations. We worked this year building a play area and putting together several pieces of new playground equipment that were installed at Rec Park. Cement pads were poured at Garrish Park and new picnic tables were installed. A new 16' Soccer Kickborad was rebuilt and installed at Thornton Burgess School. We also built a handicapped access ramp in front of the Town Hall and planted trees in several areas of town. As in the past, the Highway Department responds to fire calls that are received during our normal working hours.


Again this year many maintenance jobs were repeated. All roads were patched as needed, the cleaning of catch basins was done, as was the sweeping of several miles of designated roads. All Highway Department vehicles were repaired and maintained. Grading of all gravel roads, shoulder cutting and roadside trimming was also completed. Last winter, the Town's trailers, stone box, and tag-a-long broom were rebuilt by the department.

During the past year the Highway Department has begun overseeing the maintenance and day-to-day operations of the Sanitary Landfill. Likewise, the Public Grounds Department was incorporated into the Highway Department. Public Grounds involves the mowing, trimming and maintenance of all public grounds which includes both schools, Prospect Hill Cemetery and The Old Cemetery, the Town Common, the Town Hall, Academy Hall, Fire House, Rec Park, Garrish Park and roadsides. As in the past, we were able to hire two temporary grounds workers to help with mowing and trimming.

I would like to thank the Board of Selectmen and their secretary, the many members of the Town House, the Police and Fire Departments, and the members of the Highway Department for their support and cooperation they have shown over the past year.

REPORT OF THE COMPUTER STUDY COMMITTEE

The Computer Study Committee had been established by the Board of Selectmen to determine first, if there were any functions of the Town that could be more efficiently performed through some level of computerization, and second, to determine what, if any, steps could be taken to accomplish this.

The answer to the first question was yes: such functions as the Town Clerk could be much more efficiently maintained on a computer, and, in fact, it is presently being done on a computer at a local business. Also, computerization was viewed as a plus for the Tax Collector and the Town Accountant, who presently keeps the Town's books on his home computer.

We have been in contact with many other towns of all sizes to see what process they went through to find different solutions and evaluate them. In this manner we could learn from their mistakes and perhaps come across a solution presently implemented in another town that would be perfect for our needs.

The following types of systems were analyzed: separate personal computers, networked personal computers, and minicomputers.

A large system, mini- or mainframe, was viewed as unfeasible, both from an economical and practical standpoint.

Our recommendation is to set up, over a period of three to five years, a system of network personal computers.

Features include:

- This architecture can be accomplished gradually
- It allows for easy expansion
- It is an economical solution

Any computers that were to be upgraded by advances in software or hardware could be turned over to the Hampden schools, which also have a very pressing need for quality computers for both the office and students.

REPORT OF SCHOOL COMMITTEE AND SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

The Hampden School Committee is pleased to present its report for the calendar year 1987.

From an educational perspective, the year presented a continuation of the revision and development of the instructional program that was commenced three years ago. This process to date has resulted in a major rewriting of the curriculum and the establishment of a formal structure that provides for a continuous assessment of the instructional program. Curriculum committees have been permanently established and meet on a monthly basis. Additionally, several half days are scheduled to assist in this regard. The Committee strongly feels that the essence of the school system is the program of instruction. It recognizes with appreciation the work that has been accomplished. Furthermore, it is pleased that the process was undertaken and is being maintained by a community of interests as parents, teachers, administrators, and school committee members are all involved.

A prime example of the "Community of Interest" concept is the K-8 Instructional Committee. This committee is jointly chaired by Principals Farrell and Paliotta. Its members include two parents appointed by the School Improvement Councils. Presently serving are Elleen Nelson and Pamela Hebert. The three Horace Mann grant teachers representing the teaching staff also serve on this committee. Present Horace Mann grant recipients are Charlotte Miller, Patricia Downes, and Cynthia O'Sullivan. The School Committee representative to the committee is Mary Ellen Glover. The primary functions of the Committee are twofold. First, it serves as an oversight committee relative to the K/8 program of studies. Secondly, it serves as a catalyst for curriculum change. This year its energies have been directed toward a revision of the Health Curriculum with serious consideration being given to the matter of contemporary health concerns.

In this regard, a special committee consisting of Principals, staff members, and parents has been organized. With mounting concern about substance abuse and alds, and with a consensus that enlightenment through education is an essential ingredient in the address of these matters, this committee is considering how best the instructional program can instruct students in the rudiments of good health. Serving on this committee are parental representatives William Jobbins and Cherl Peck. Staff representatives are Helen Colling, Barbara Walsh, Gisela Leven, Sandra Jarvis, Jane McCarthy, and Mae Simonson. Principals Farrell and Pallotta are members of the committee. Ad hoc members of the committee are Dr. Joseph Hebert and Juhan Laurits.

The School Improvement Councils, a program required under the terms of the Massachusetts Educational Reform Act, represent another significant adjunct to the matter of developing the program of instruction. Under the terms of the act, the councils are chaired by the building principals. Its membership consists of parents and teachers. It is the recipient of an annual state grant which it may spend at its discretion for goods or services that will improve the educational process. Additionally, it appoints parent representatives to the K-8 Instructional Committee. Serving on the Green Meadows School Improvement Council are Principal Farrell, staff members Warren Amerman, Phyllis Walsh, Joyce Hess, and Jean Godek. Parental representatives are Elleen Nelson, Maureen Coughlin, and Janice Gallivan.
Serving on the Thornton Burgess School Improvement Council are Principal Pallotta, staff representatives Johanna Fregeau, Janina Luczek and Cecella

cholas. Parental representatives are Mary Beth Davidson, Linda Mumper, mela Hebert and Patricia Pantuosco.

other "Community of Interest" important to the instructional program are the lunteers in Service to the Public Schools. Again in 1987, as in the past, schools and its program have been well and generously served by the volunteers. The "VIPS", as they are called, respond to teacher requests for classroom presentations on curriculum related matters and on topics of general interest. The contributions of the volunteer are an important adjunct to the educational process.

The Committee acknowledges with appreciation the many contributions of the several "Communities of Interest" to the instructional process. It feels that the special perspectives that each element brings to the process enhances the end result.

GREEN MEADOWS REFURBISHING PROJECT

The Committee began its consideration of the refurbishing of the Green Meadows School. In this regard, it appointed a Green Meadows Refurbishing Committee comprised of town officials, residents, and School Committee representatives. Serving on this committee were John Flynn, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen; Lucille Mulcahy and Lester Pauly of the Hampden Advisory Committee; Mary Ellen Glover and Joseph D'Agostino of the School Committee. Mr. Alan Fritts and Mr. Francis Netherwood served on the Committee as community representatives. Charles Schmitt, architect and John Partyka, engineer, served as consultants. The Committee developed an assessment of needs which was presented to the School Committee for its consideration and subsequent presentation to the Town. The Committee thanks the members of the Refurbishing Committee for the generous gifts of time and talent in the important matter of restoring the Green Meadows School. The Committee expects that this project will be part of the upcoming Town Meeting agenda. It respectfully solicits community support for this.

HAMPDEN-WILBRAHAM REGIONAL SCHOOL DISTRICT 1987 Town Report

Minnechaug's graduating Class of 1987 has scattered to all points of the compass, having set a record for percentage of the class continuing their education beyond high school. Forty-six percent have enrolled in four-year colleges, fifteen percent at two-year colleges, and fifteen percent at other institutions.

Student schedules at the high school show a marked increase in the selection of a more traditional college preparatory program. A review of enrollment by department indicates that students are selecting mathematics, science, and foreign language courses much more frequently than students of the 1960s and 1970s. Fifty percent of Minnechaug's student population is enrolled in foreign language courses and over thirty percent are enrolled in mathematics classes that are classified as third-year college preparatory, or above.

A special "tip of the hat" to Mr. Granaudo and Minnechaug's Mathletes. Competing in a league of eighteen teams, Minnechaug placed first in 1986-87 and have placed first for ten of the past thirteen years. The team has also fared well in state and national competitions.

The English Department at Minnechaug is participating in two new programs. The first is a study skills program required of students enrolled in the intermediate earth science course. The second program is funded by a grant from the Massachusetts Council on Arts and Humanities. This grant allows actors from Stage West to present day-long workshops at the high school to prepare students for the viewing of performances at Stage West. Students first read the plays as part of their English curriculum, attend the in-house field trip with the actors, and then attend the performance.

The Social Studies Department has been concerned with updating course curriculum descriptions. As a result, new course descriptions have been written with the creation of a new Grade 10 course with geography as a major area of focus.

A Horace Mann Grant Report, dealing with the issue of adolescent health needs, has recommended that a coordinated health program become a part of the high school curriculum. A committee dealing with the issues of AIDS education, and policies regarding employees and students who have been diagnosed as AIDS patients, has been formed and will be making recommendations to the school committee in the near future. This committee is comprised of representatives of the Hampden, Wilbraham, and Hampden-Wilbraham Regional School Committees.

Implementation of the Educational Reform Act has continued at the regional high school. Minnechaug students have scored exceptionally well on both basic skills testing and curriculum assessment tests given as a result of Chapter 188. One of the most successful segments of Chapter 188 has proven to be the School Improvement Council. The council has brought faculty and parents closer together as to the goals of the school and has enhanced the curriculum offering, by providing a variety of enrichment programs for students.

Replacement of the roof at Minnechaug continues to be a serious problem. The School Building Assistance Bureau has been at a standstill awaiting the recently signed legislation which provides money and guidelines for its operation. Unfortunately, it does not appear that the level of appropriation will be high enough to provide funds to the regional district for the next two years. As the condition of the roof deteriorates, it may become necessary for the school committee and selectmen to consider replacing the roof with local funds and receiving state reimbursement retroactively.

The Lower Pioneer Valley Educational Collaborative continues to provide occupational education opportunities for our students. With the reopening of Mile Tree School by the Wilbraham School Committee, it was necessary to transfer the fashion design, allied health, and vocational assessment programs to Minnechaug. In the fall of 1988, all of the collaborative programs must vacate Mile Tree. It has not been determined yet where the programs will be located, as space is becoming more difficult to obtain in the buildings of the seven member towns.

Over the last several years, the Town has had to defer modernizations, refurbishings and maintenance actions in order to keep expenses under restrictions of Proposition $2\frac{1}{2}$.

While special articles and operating budgets have been contained in the limits of Proposition $2\frac{1}{2}$, no longer is it possible to defer these modernizations, refurbishing and maintenance actions without near term action.

To defer any longer would only significantly increase the cost to the Town in the relatively immediate future.

Furthermore, while we have recommended a $5\frac{1}{2}\%$ salary increase, many town departments have taken issue and are requesting additional increases.

These issues cannot, however, be addressed adequately within current budget requests and limitations of $2\frac{1}{2}$.

It is the Advisory Committee feeling that these 2 major issues have to be addressed now and a plan of action has been initiated.

To understand this plan and evaluate the impact on the Town and you, the individual taxpayer, we urge all Town's people to come to the Advisory Committee Budget Hearing on March 22, 1988 at 8:00 P.M., in the Town House auditorium. Listen to departmental concerns, express your feelings, ask questions and participate:

The outcome of this meeting is critical to the future of Hampden and to you!

GREETING:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Hampden qualified to vote in Town Affairs, to meet at Thornton Burgess School, Wilbraham Road, Hampden, on Monday, April 25, 1988 at eight o'clock in the evening, then and there to act on the following articles:

ARTICLE 1. To hear the Annual Reports of all the officers of the Town and any committee whose duty it may be to report at said meeting, and act thereon.

To see if the Town will vote to fix the salary and compensation of all elective officers of the Town as provided for by Section 108 of Chapter 41, General Laws and to raise and appropriate the necessary sums to cover same; and to raise money and make appropriations to defray the expenses of the Town for the period July 1, 1988 to June 30, 1989.

PREVIOUS BILLS ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the payment of any departmental bills of the year 1986-1987 or previous years, and will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money therefore.

HIGHWAYS

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for necessary road work on North Road, South Road, and Bennett Road or other roads as necessary, any part of such expenditures reimbursed by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts to be used to discharge any borrowing done in anticipation of such reimbursement from the Commonwealth, or take any other action relative thereto.

PICK-UP TRUCK

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate and/or transfer from available funds a sum of money for the purchase of a 1988 one-ton, four wheel drive pick-up truck with plow with trade-in of present 1983 Ford 3/4 ton pick-up truck or take any other action relative thereto.

TRACTOR WITH PLOW & MOWER

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate and/or transfer from available funds a sum of money for the purchase of a 1988 Tractor with plow and mower with trade-in of 1978 Ford 1600, or take any other action relative thereto.

AMEND ZONING BY-LAWS

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning By-Laws of the Town of Hampden by additions, deletions, and substitutions as follows:

- 6.7 FLOOD PLAIN & WETLAND DISTRICTS
- 6.7.2 USE REGULATIONS

Delete Section 6.7.2.4 and substitute;

6.7.2.4 The portion of any lot within the area delineated on the Hampden Zoning Map as Flood Plain and Wetlands District or other existing wetland as defined by M.G.L. Chapter 131, Section 40, may be used to meet the area and yard requirements for the District or Districts in which the remainder of the lot is situated (provided the proposed construction site be contiguous non-wetland area of at least 75% of the minimum lot area requirements),

Add new Section 6.7.2.5:

6.7.2.5 Where the bounds as delineated are in doubt, the burden of proof shall be upon the owner(s) of the land in question, to show where they should be properly located. However, the Town of Hampden retains its authority to determine the actual boundaries of the wetland within the area in question;

or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate and/or transfer a sum of money from available funds to be used for reconstruction and paving of parking areas at Green Meadows School and Town House, or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a bylaw to create and empower a Capital Improvements Planning Committee as follows:

"Section 1: The Board of Selectmen shall establish and appoint a committee to be known as the Capital Improvement Planning Committee, composed of one member of the Board of Selectmen, one member of the Finance Committee, one member of the Planning Board and the School Superintendent or his designee, plus no more than three additional members at-large for a period of one year. The Town Accountant (or the Executive Secretary or other administrative officer) shall be an ex-officio Committee staff member without the right to vote. The Committee shall choose its own officers.

Section 2: The Committee shall study proposed capital projects and improvements involving major non-recurring tangible assets and projects which 1) are purchased or undertaken at intervals of not less than five years; 2) have a useful life of at least five years; and 3) cost over \$10,000. All officers, boards and committees, including the Selectmen and the School Committee, shall by November 1 of each year, give to the Committee, on forms prepared by it, information concerning all

anticipated projects requiring Town Meeting action during the ensuing six years. The Committee shall consider the relative need, impact, timing and cost of these expenditures and the effect each will have on the financial position of the town. No appropriation shall be voted for a capital improvement requested by a department, board or commission unless the proposed capital improvement is considered in the Committee's report, or the Committee shall first have submitted a report to the Board of Selectmen explaining the omission.

Section 3: The Committee shall prepare an annual report recommending a Capital Improvement Budget for the next fiscal year, and a Capital Improvement Program including recommended capital improvements for the following five fiscal years. The report shall be submitted to the Board of Selectmen for its consideration and approval. The Board shall submit its approved Capital Budget to the Annual Town Meeting for adoption by the town.

Section 4: Such Capital Improvement Program, after its adoption shall permit the expenditure on projects included therein of sums from departmental budgets for surveys, architectural or engineering advice, options or appraisals; but no such expenditure shall be incurred on projects which have not been so approved by the town through the appropriation of sums in the current year or in prior years, or for preliminary planning for projects to be undertaken more than five years in the future.

Section 5: The Committee's report and the Selectmen's recommended Capital Budget shall be published and made available in a manner consistent with the distribution of the Finance Committee report. The Committee shall deposit its original report with the Town Clerk, or take any other action relative thereto."

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CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECT ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for remodeling, reconstructing, and making extraordinary repairs to the Green Meadows Elementary School, the Town House, the Town garage, and recreational and athletic facilities, and for acquiring a new dump truck and fuel storage tank; to determine whether this appropriation shall be raised by borrowing or otherwise; or to take any other action relative thereto.

LIBRARY STATE AID ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from the Library Fund the amount of \$2,373 to be used by the Library Trustees at their discretion, or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote that in Fiscal Year 1989, if additional State Aid for Library is received, this money will be made available for Library Trustees to use at their discretion, or take any other action relative thereto.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the Conservation Fund, said Fund to be used for the purpose of acquiring available land for the Town for Conservation purposes, if said purchase is voted upon and approved at Annual or Special Town Meeting prior to such purchase, or take any other action relative thereto.

RESERVE FUND

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money for the Reserve Fund, or take any other action relative thereto.

BORROWING

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1988, or in anticipation of certain grants or reimbursement from the Commonwealth, in accordance with provisions of General Laws, Chapter 44, Sections 4 and 6A, and to issue a note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year, in accordance with General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 17, or take any other action relative thereto.

OVERLAY RESERVE FUND

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to transfer a sum of money from Overlay Reserve to the Reserve Fund, or take any other action relative thereto.

STABILIZATION FUND

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to transfer a sum of money from the Overlay Reserve Fund to the Stabilization Fund, or take any other action relative thereto.

REDUCING TAX RATE

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury a sum of money for the purpose of reducing the tax rate for Fiscal 1989, or take any other action relative thereto.

And you are further required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Hampden qualified to vote in elections of Town officers to meet at the Hampden Town House, 625 Main Street, Hampden, on Monday, the second of May, AD 1988 at eight o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to give in their votes on one ballot to the election officers of said Town for the following officers, to wit:

To choose for the term of one year the following: One Moderator, one Tree Warden, and one Cemetery Commissioner.

To choose for the term of three years the following: One Selectmen, one Assessor, one Library Trustee, one Cemetery Commissioner, two Park Commissioners, one member of the Hampden School Committee, and one member of the Planning Board.

To choose for the term of four years the following: One member of the Planning Board.

To choose for the term of five years the following: One member of the Hampden Housing Authority, and one member of the Planning Board.

Also to choose all other necessary Town Officers.
