## **Report** of Auditor

January 13, 1960

Board of Selectmen Town of Hampden Hampden, Massachusetts

Gentlemen:

In accordance with the statutes of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts I have examined the accounts and records of the various departments of the Town of Hampden for the year ended December 31, 1959.

I did not make a detailed audit of all transactions, and the examination was, therefore, not sufficient in scope to disclose all possible errors or irregularities. However, by making substantial checks, and by use of various other auditing procedures to the extent deemed appropriate in the circumstances, I believe the general accuracy of the records has been fairly tested.

All real estate, personal property, and motor vehicle excise taxes committed by the assessors for collection were checked to the Tax Collector's records and to the Bookkeeper's General Ledger. Collections made on these taxes were traced from the Tax Collector's Cash Books through the Treasurer's Cash Book and to the Bookkeeper's General Ledger for the entire year.

In September the regular bienniel audit was made by State authorities under the direction of the Director of Accounts, Department of Corporations and Taxation, covering the period from August 31, 1957, the date of the previous examination, to September 19, 1959.

Advices of payments by the State and other political subdivisions to the Town during the period September 1, through December 31 were traced through the Treasurer's Cash Book and Bookkeeper's General Ledger. All such advices were accounted for and found to be properly entered.

All receipts and disbursements for the same period recorded in the Treasurer's Cash Book were checked against the original Schedules of Receipts and Treasury Warrants transmitted for payment. These amounts were also reconciled with the Bookkeeper's General Ledger.

The appropriation accounts in the Bookkeeper's General Ledger were reviewed and compared with the recorded votes of town meetings.

Transfers from the various fund accounts were compared with either authorizations of the Advisory Board or recorded votes of town meetings.

Although my examination was necessarily limited in scope, I believe the information obtained by application of the procedures outlined in this report is sufficient to establish in my mind a favorable opinion as to the general accuracy of the accounts and records of the town for the year of 1959.

#### **RECREATION COMMITTEE REPORT**

The Hampden Recreation Committee is again pleased to report that this year's activities were participated in by a larger number of people than ever before. As many as four hundred fifty people per day used the Park and its facilities during supervised hours. Swimming and baseball were the season's most active programs. Arts and crafts, volley ball, croquet, soccer, horseshoes, and basketball were also offered.

Alvin J. McNeill, field director, reports that Hampden was second among community pools in the Greater Springfield area for Red Cross swimming awards. The Recreation Committee commends Mr. McNeill for his well organized water safety program. A total of 153 certificates were awarded between the categories of beginner and senior life saver. This included 53 beginner awards. A swimming meet was held for the first time in which eighty local youngsters competed. Because of its success, plans are being made to hold a similar meet annually on a weekend so that more adults can attend. For the first time, weekend supervision was included to insure a safer swimming program. This was made possible by volunteers.

The interest in baseball continues to grow. A new area has been graded for a second diamond. It is planned to have this area ready for the coming baseball season.

The younger set particularly enjoyed the arts and crafts program. Its success was due to the voluntary assistance of a number of mothers. We want to again express our sincere appreciation for the working help and interest shown by fellow townspeople. Without this help the successful 1959 season would not have been possible. We will again be calling on many of you to help during 1960.

## REPORT OF THE TREE WARDEN

The following work has been necessary in 1959:

In the Spring, with the help of the Highway Department, four dead maples were cut along the highway. We used the Town truck to clean up the dead wood. I also hired men from the Northern Tree Co. of Palmer to do some much needed trimming in the center of Town.

In the summer one storm did much damage to the maples near Raymond Dunlea's home and the elm tree near Mrs. Swenson's home. Seventeen sealing calls were made with the following results: 127 units sealed, 2 non-sealed and adjustments were made on 11 devices to bring them within the established specifications as laid down by the Commonwealth. Sealing fees collected were \$34.70 in accordance with Chapter 98, Section 56 of the General Laws. These fees have been turned over to the Town Treasurer. The books of the Department were checked by the State Auditors as of Sept. 30 and found in order. Inspections were made on 42 items of prepackaged foods which included vegetables, meats and poultry, butter, margerine and maple syrup. Thirty-one of these packages were found to weigh correctly, 9 over weight and one under. None were found in an excess or deficient condition which prohibited them from being sold legally.

76 clinical thermometers were inspected and all bore the required Massachusetts State Seal and supplied certificates showing compliance with State tolerances. Serial numbers were spot-checked and 22 of these numbers recorded on the Department records.

Some difficulty was encountered wherein one store misunderstood the requirements as to the proper marking of prepackaged merchandise but with consultations with the owner and higher officials of the suppliers of this store the matter was quickly rectified.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE HAMPDEN PLANNING BOARD FOR THE YEAR 1959

The Planning Board has continued to hold two regular meetings a month — one to consider the cases or problems that confront the board and the other a workshop meeting during which new laws are discussed and the old laws reviewed to consider possible improvement or revision.

The Zoning Map has been brought up to date and copies have been delivered into the hands of the Board by Harold F. Helberg who has indicated on them to correct scale the new or enlarged Business Zones, the new streets and any other necessary changes.

The Business Zone near the center of the town has been enlarged by changing the remainder of their property on Main Street from Residence A to Business on the petition of William and Margaret Buereau for which a hearing was held on July 3rd. The change was unanimously approved at a vote of a special town meeting in the fall.

Relative to valuating the possibilities for prospective business in this town, the Planning Board conducted a survey last year sending letters to each landowner having any or all of his land in a Business Zone not now being utilized for such to ascertain as to its availability. Letters were received from most of he landowners, many of which were in the negative. However, the results proved that there is still some land available. The Board also held a joint meeting with the Board of Selectmen and the Board of Appeals relative to attracting more business to Hampden.

This Board also met with the Longmeadow Planning Board on September 14th to exchange ideas on problems which confront a Planning Board and their solution. This meeting proved most rewarding and the Board will coninue this policy to meet with the Boards of other neighboring towns during the coming year.

Building activity in town during the year 1959 has continued steady. Whereas in 1958, 16 new houses were built, during 1959 15 new homes were constructed.

During the year 1959 ground was broken for the new 40-bedroom nursing home which is in the process of construction. The owners, Louis and Arlene Levine, expect that it will be completed so that it can be opened during the month of March, 1960.

On the whole the Board feels that the growth of Hampden has been most gratifying during the past year.
