Moderator's Report

TO: Board of Selectmen — Hampden, Massachusetts

DATE: January 13, 1961

This is the first of a projected series of Annual reports, intended to increase understanding of the proper conduct of Town Meetings.

A state law passed in 1960 changed the conduct of Elections, including a Town Election, which is actually part of the Town Meeting. Supervision was assigned to an Election Warden and his Deputy, both appointed Ly the Selectmen. Counting of ballots prior to the 8 P. M. closing of the polls was prohibited. This ruling was made to prevent improper disclosure of early ballotcounts which might influence later voters. The recent Presidential election was the first so conducted. In Hampden and in some other towns, the Moderator served as Election Warden but aside from the experience factor. the Warden need not be the Moderator. In this election, the services of the Deputy Warden, Mr. John M. Flynn, and the Inspectors and Tellers who produced an impressively quick count of a record vote (94.1% of the 1,273 registered voters), should be appreciated.

The recent annual meeting of the Massachusetts Moderators Association reflected not only the wide differences in sizes and attitudes of towns, but also the rapid growth of some towns, which brings many previous city dwellers to Town Meetings for the first time. As a result, the rule of the Moderator and the general rules of conduct have been questioned. The Moderators themselves have looked critically at their responsibilities and at parliamentary procedures best fitted to conducting Town Meetings.

Our Hampden By-Laws clarify some points of order and refer to Robert's Rules of Order for all others. In many respects, Robert's Rules are not well suited to Town Meetings and for this reason, the Massachusetts Moderator's Handbook was devised. Even so, there remain many questions of procedure for which there is no recommended practice.

Four of these were discussed by the Moderator's Association, but the majority favored no standard practice. The preference was to leave these questions to the judgment of the Moderator, or to the "ancient custom" of the individual town. This desire for flexibility, of course, increases the Moderator's power.

For example, at least one town requires an unanimous vote to permit a non-voter to address a meeting. The cogent but unsuccessful minority of Moderators argued that under this rule, a single uninformed, belligerent or facetious voter could deprive all other voters of information vital to the intelligent analysis of a given issue. For example, the advice of an architect, safety engineer, legal counsel, planning expert or other authority could be so denied.

These Moderators—which included some outstanding legal experts—recommended that only a majority vote be required to permit a non-voter to address a Town Meeting. Of course, it is understood that the Moderator make certain that this privilege is fairly given to all seriously interested parties. You will recognize that this procedure is that which your Moderator has used and will continue to use in conducting Hampden Town Meetings.

Report of Board of Selectmen

With the growth of Hampden, the work and burden of decisions of the Selectmen become greater each year. Besides holding a meeting each week, preparing for the Annual Town Meeting and Special Town Meetings held during the year (there were two in 1960), each member of the Board is "on call" practically 24 hours a day. Knowing this, it is easy to understand the origin of the term "Town fathers" as applied to the Board of Selectmen.

Improvement of our highways and attendant drainage problems continued in 1960. Chapter 90 Construction work was done on Main Street and Chapin Road, and Maintenance work on Allen Street, Main Street and South Monson Road.

Chapter 81 money was spent on all roads for necessary tarring and other work. Easements were obtained from Mr. and Mrs. William Buereau and Mr. and Mrs. Alex Bandoski and the old river bed was filled in behind their property on Main St. Drainage work was done on Crestwood Lane, with easement being obtained from Walter Barbour. A used salt spreader was purchased for the Highway Dept. at a cost of only \$100.

The installation of the new boiler and insulation in the Town House has resulted in a saving in fuel of \$451 during the period September, 1959—April, 1960.

In accordance with new State law, the Selectmen appointed for a term of one year a Warden, Deputy Warden, Clerk, Inspectors and Tellers to serve at all elections. These folks gave a very good account of themselves, particularly at the National Election, when 94.1% of the voters went to the polls, and the counting of ballots couldn't start until the polls closed.

In addition to the regular icenses to sell milk, etc., the Selectmen issued 3 permits for underground gasoline storage tanks, following public hearings.

Several new businesses opened in Hampden this past year, and the Town now has a weekly newspaper which reaches all homes. Several organizations participated in the Monson Bicentennial Celebration in October.

The work of the Selectmen brings them into contact with all Town Committees and officers, and the cooperation and assistance of these officials is appreciated.

Report of the Superintendent of Streets

Much was accomplished throughout the year with Chapter 81 allotment of \$13,300 of which the state allocated \$10.650 and the town's share was \$2850. Out of this allotment the department spent the money for scraping dirt roads, drainage where needed, new culverts, gravelling, signs, mowing the roadsides and a large portion for resurfacing the hard surface roads with asphalt and a pea stone cover. This sum is distributed and spent according to plans set up in the spring at a conference with the Selectmen, the Superintendent of Streets and the Supervisor of the Massachusetts Department of Public Works. There is never enough money in this account to do all the work over the town that either the department or the Selectmen would like to see accomplished, but some of this Chapter 81 money was set up for permanent work. With this portion 650 feet on Mountain Road was gravelled and hardened as well as considerable improvements on Sessions Drive. On the latter, the old road had to be excavated for lack of a suitable foundation.

The Chapter 90 Maintenance Fund totalled \$4500, made up of \$1500 from state, \$1500 from the county and \$1500 from the town. With this, Springfield Road (Allen Street) was completely resurfaced with asphalt and pea stone cover from Stony Hill Road south to the Hampden House corner and also Main Street from the junction of Somers and Wilbraham Roads, easterly to the Type-I section near Buereau's Garage with the exception of the Type-I surface at the Point o' Rocks.

About 100 tons of hot mix were used on Main Street to correct the uneven surface near the old mill dam. At this point the road had become rough and settled somewhat by the ravages of the 1955 flood and the frost action over the years. This Chapter 90 Maintenance money must be used to maintain the existing hard surface roads constructed under Chapter 90 Construction allocation. This resurfacing has to be done where the need is greatest for the current year with the goal that all Chapter 90 roads will be resurfaced according to the years in which they have been constructed, with some definite plan of order.

During the past year the sum of \$12,000 was available for Chapter 90 Construction of which the state allotted \$6000, the county \$3000 and the town \$3000. Permission was granted by the state to use some of this total to alter the drainage and partially fill in the Scantic River bed near the Bandoski home on Main Street. This was done and a heavy stone embankment laid along the new river channel to prevent erosion of Bandoski's back land. About \$2000 was required for this.

The remainder, or \$10,000, was spent on Chapin Road. The hard surface was completed to the Earle Walker place, head walls built on a four-foot culvert pipe and widening, grading and partial gravelling to the state line completed. A heavy bulldozer worked nearly a month literally carving the road out of ledge and heavy boulder formation which characterizes the entire terrain. Blasting was necessary for quite a stretch. The year 1961 will see the completion of this road with the hardened surface.

A few of the other accomplishments of the Highway Department during the year 1960 are the resurfacing of the parking area at the Elementary School, the resurfacing of the road to Hampden Memorial Park, roofing over the salt bin at the town garage, removing numerous large stones which had worked up to the surface through frost action on many of the secondary roads, also restoring the catch basins and assisting Walter Barbour with drainage on Sessions Drive.

The stormy month of December and the blizzard of the 12th have depleted the snow and ice removal appropriation of 1960. This appropriation should be sufficient to cover winter conditions but the need becomes greater each year as more streets are added. And, with the changing times, the clang of broken tire chains is almost a thing of the past. The motorists of to-day demand ice and snow-free roads.
