To: Either of the Constables of the said Town of Hampden in said County:

GREETING:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are hereby required to notify and warn all the inhabitants of the Town of Hampden qualified to vote in elections of Town Officers to meet at the Town House on Tuesday, the twenty-third day of February, A.D. 1965, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to give in their votes on one ballot to the election officers of said Town for the following officers, to wit:

To choose for the term of one year the following: One Moderator, one Town Clerk and Town Treasurer, one Collector of Taxes, one Tree Warden, and one Auditor.

To choose for the term of three years the following: One Selectman, who shall also be on the Board of Public Welfare; one Assessor, two School Committee members, one Library Trustee, three Constables, one Cemetery Commissioner.

To choose for the term of five years the following: One member of the Planning Board.

Also to choose all other necessary Town Officers.

The polls shall be open at 10 A.M. and shall close at 8 P.M.

And you are further hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Hampden, qualified to vote in Town Affairs, to meet at the Hampden Elementary School, Hampden on Monday, March 1, A.D. 1965 at eight o'clock in the evening, then and there to act on the following articles, viz.:

ARTICLE 1. To hear the Annual Reports of all the officers of the Town and any committee whose duty it may be to report at said meeting, and act thereon.

The Advisory Committee requests that their report and recommended budget be thoughtfully read and studied.

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ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for a well and water system to be installed at the Town Garage.

The Advisory Committee recommends that \$1,000 be raised and appropriated in accordance with the above article.

ARTICLE 3. To see what disposition the Town will make of the Dog Fund, now in the hands of the Treasurer.

The Advisory Committee recommends that this fund be paid into the Library Account. 473952

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,925 for the repair and maintenance of Town Roads and instruct the Selectmen to petition and contract with the Commissioners of the Department of Public Works, under the provisions of Chapter 81, Section 26 of the General Laws.

The Advisory Committee recommends favorable action.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used in conjunction with any money which may be allotted by the State or County, or both, for Chapter 90 Maintenance, and instruct the Selectmen to petition and contract with the Commissioners of the Department of Public Works and the Commissioners of Hampden County, under the provisions of Chapter 90, Section 34.

The Advisory Committee recommends that the sum of \$2,500 be raised and appropriated for the use of Chapter 90 Maintenance.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used in conjunction with any money which may be allotted by the State or County, or both, for the widening and surfacing of South Monson Road and/or Bennett Road, and instruct the Selectmen to petition and contract with the Commissioners of the Department of Public Works and the Commissioners of Hampden County, under the provisions of Chapter 90, Section 34.

The Advisory Committee recommends that the sum of \$3,500 be raised and appropriated in accordance with the preceding article.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury a sum of money for the State share of Chapter 81 and the State and County share of Chapter 90 Highway programs.

The Advisory Committee recommends the transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury the sum of \$26,225 for Chapter 81 and 90 highway work as outlined in the three preceding articles.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to transfer a sum of money from the Overlay Reserve to the Reserve Fund.

The Advisory Committee recommends the transfer of \$7,500 from the Overlay Reserve to the Reserve Fund. 1/otes

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury a sum of money to the Stabilization Fund.

The Advisory Committee recommends that \$20,000 be transferred from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury to the Stabilization Fund.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the payment of any departmental bills of the year 1964 or previous years, from the 1965 appropriations. DISMISSEE

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury a sum of money for the purchase of a fire truck.

The Advisory Committee recommends the transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury the sum of \$26,000 for the purchase of a fire truck.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning By-Laws of the Town of Hampden, Section VI. Temporary Uses, by adding the following:

"Proposed Rules and Regulations for Trailers.

Definition of a trailer: An automobile trailer, trailer coach, and any portable structure or vehicle, so designed as to permit occupancy thereof for Dwelling, Sleeping, or Work Purposes.

b. No trailer for human habitation shall be allowed for any purpose without the permission of the Board of Selectmen, except any extension of time over 30 days (thirty) may be granted by the Board of Selectmen, after a public hearing and abutters notified.

The parking of any trailer shall be behind the setback line of the dwelling on said lot or next adjoining lot, if no dwelling exists 50 tock 5741NE 20151 on said lot."

The Advisory Committee will withhold their recommendation pending further clarification of the above article. 115M15Sel

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ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following resolution:

"WHEREAS the General Court sitting as a Constitutional Convention, did on July 16, 1963, give initial approval to a Home Rule amendment to the State Constitution, and WHEREAS this bill of rights for local governments requires a second approval by the Members of the General Court during this legislative session, and WHEREAS we, as members of this Town Meeting, feel competent to handle the affairs of our town without strict supervision by the Commonwealth of our every act and deed; NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that this town meeting hereby instructs its representatives to the General Court to vote in favor of the Home Rule proposal (H 1384 of 1963, as revised) when it comes before them."

The Advisory Committee recommends favorable action.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for remodeling the auditorium in the Town House; including installation of new ceiling, new flooring, painting, and installation of new lighting; also repairs to rear steps and roof.

The Advisory Committee recommends that a sum not exceeding \$4,800 be raised and appropriated in accordance with the preceding article.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of Section 97A, Chapter 41 of the General Laws.

The Advisory Committee recommends favorable action.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000 for the purpose of salary of Chief of Police, purchase of police vehicle, and other necessary supplies and equipment.

The Advisory Committee recommends that \$12,000 be raised and appropriated in accordance with the preceding article.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600 to be used in connection with expenses of taking the required State Census of 1965.

The Advisory Committee recommends that \$600 be raised and appropriated in accordance with the preceding article.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following sums of money for perpetual care of the following cemetery lots:

The lot of Wesley J. Officer, the sum of \$150.

The lot of Neil S. Kibbe, the sum of \$200.

The lot of Anton Woska, the sum of \$100.

The lot of Horace O. Davis, the sum of \$100.

The Advisory Committee recommends favorable action.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from Road Machinery Fund a sum of money for the purchase of a highway sander.

The Advisory Committee recommends that \$2,400 be transferred from the Road Machinery Fund for the purpose of purchasing a highway sander.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 to be donated to the East Longmeadow Ambulance Fund, in gratitude for the services performed to residents of Hampden.

The Advisory Committee recommends that \$100 be raised and appropriated in accordance with the preceding article.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500 to pave the south parking area at the Hampden Elementary School.

The Advisory Committee recommends that \$1,500 be raised and appropriated in accordance with the preceding article.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to amend the agreement between the Towns of Wilbraham and Hampden, Massachusetts, with respect to the formation of a Regional School District as adopted by each of said towns on October 22, 1956, so as to include grades seven through twelve in said Regional School District. The form of said amendments 16 Caps being as filed with the Selectmen.

The Advisory Committee recommends favorable action.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for construction of swimming facilities at Hampden Memorial Park.

The Advisory Committee recommends that the Moderator appoint a committee of seven, including two Recreation Commission members, one member of the Board of Selectmen, one member of the Hampden School Committee and three citizens, to make a study and to bring their recommendations to the next Annual Town Meeting. Also, that a sum of \$150 be raised and appropriated for expenses of said committee.

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ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for construction of a hard surfaced multi-purpose play area at Hampden Memorial Park.

The Advisory Committee recommends that this article be referred to the committee appointed under Article 23 for inclusion in their study and recommendation.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning By-Laws by changing from Residence A to Business the following described parcel of land:

Beginning at an iron pin set on the north bank of the Scantic River at the southwesterly corner of land now or formerly of Barbara K. Hatch and May B. Hatch; thence N. 46° 30′ 30″ E. along land now or formerly of William L. Buereau, two hundred eighty-nine and 34/100 (289.34) feet to an iron pin at the southwesterly corner of land now or formerly of Harold F. and Jeannette R. Green; thence S. 50° 14′ 00″ W. along other land of said Hatches, three hundred forty-four and 51/100 (344.51) feet to an iron pin set in the northerly bank of the Scantic River; thence running in a westerly, northerly and northwesterly direction along the north bank of the Scantic River, two hundred sixty-three (263) feet to the iron pin at the point of beginning.

The Advisory Committee recommends favorable action.

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ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to fix the salary and compensation of all elective officers of the Town as provided for by Section 108 of Chapter 41, General Laws, and to raise and appropriate the necessary sums to cover same; to raise money and make appropriations to defray the expenses of the Town for the ensuing year.

The Advisory Committee recommends acceptance of the budget as indicated in its recommended amounts on pages 93 through 101.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to accept a way as laid out by the Selectmen on February 6, 1965, which way is substantially described as follows: Brookside Drive, from #21 to the end, a distance of 315 feet, more or less.

The Advisory Committee will make a recommendation on this article at the Town Meeting. ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to accept a way as laid out by the Selectmen on February 6, 1965, which way is substantially described as follows: Baldwin Drive, a distance of 500 feet southerly from the junction of Sessions Drive.

The Advisory Committee will make a recommendation on this article at the Town Meeting.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to accept a way as laid out by the Selectmen on February 6, 1965, which way is substantially described as follows: Mountainview Drive, from #27 and #28 a distance of 300 feet, more or less, to #46 and #47.

The Advisory Committee will make a recommendation on this article at the Town Meeting.

ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town will vote to accept a way as laid out by the Selectmen on February 6, 1965, which way is substantially described as follows: Sessions Drive, a distance of 2500 feet, more or less, from the junction of Baldwin Drive easterly to the turnaround.

The Advisory Committee will make a recommendation on this article at the Town Meeting.

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to accept a way as laid out by the Selectmen on February 6, 1965, which way is substantially described as follows: Circle View Drive, from Lot 18 southerly to Allen Street, a distance of 750 feet, more or less.

The Advisory Committee recommends favorable action.

ARTICLE 32. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1965, and to issue a note or notes and renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year, in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44 of the General Laws.

The Advisory Committee recommends favorable action.

ARTICLE 33. To see if the Town will authorize the Moderator to appoint a School Survey Committee consisting of five members, including a member of the School Committee and a member of the Planning Board, said Committee to study future school needs and report its findings at the next annual Town Meeting; and to appropriate the sum of \$100 for expenses of said School Survey Committee.

The Advisory Committee recommends that \$100 be raised and appropriated in accordance with the preceding article.

ARTICLE 34. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the collection of rubbish.

The Advisory Committee recommends negative action.

ARTICLE 35. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to contract for the tearing down and removal of the old fire station on Main Street, and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

The Advisory Committee recommends that \$500 be raised and appropriated in accordance with the preceding article.

And you are directed to serve this Warrant by posting an attested copy thereof at each of the three places designated by the Town. Hereof fail not, and make due return of this Warrant with your doings thereon, to the Town Clerk at or before the time of meeting aforesaid.

REPORT OF THE ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The emergence of Hampden from a modest rural community to a rapidly growing suburban town became strikingly clear during 1964. The construction of some one hundred new residences and the introduction of a residential apartment building are the most obvious examples of the town's growth and prospects for 1965 indicate that an even greater building development will take place. In 1960, the total amount raised by taxation was slightly over \$275,000. The budget this year totals \$412,000, a 50% increase since then. Even more significant is the fact that the current budget represents an increase of \$62,000 or 17% over the 1964 figure.

The Advisory Committee met the second Tuesday of each month throughout the year with additional meetings as the situation required. The regular meetings take place at 7:30 in the Town House and are open to the public. Hearings were conducted before the Annual Meeting and the Special Town Meeting held in August 1964. In addition to the regular review of department appropriation balances, the Advisory Committee approved requests for transfers from the Reserve Fund to the following departments whose appropriations had been exhausted because of unforeseen financial drains:

The balance of \$514 in the Reserve Fund at the end of the year was returned to the Overlay Reserve.

The 1964 fiscal year saw an increase in our Free Cash position to \$94,220.63 as certified on January 1, 1965, compared with \$54,652.06 on January 1, 1964. The Surplus (E & D) account showed an increase to \$124,700.90 from \$82,180.62 to the same period. As of January 1, 1965, there is \$28,187.29 in the Stabilization Fund.

In considering the 1965 budget, the Advisory Committee met with the Selectmen, School Committees, and various other town departments. The general operating budget is increased \$56,000 from last year, of which \$38,000 pertains to school budgets. In connection with our local schools, it should be noted that the influx of new families is very apt to result in overloading of classroom facilities within the next year, despite the fact that we opened the new addition only last September. Present plans call for the transfer of the eighth grade to the Regional High School in 1966 to permit the present Hampden Junior High School to absorb the increased Elementary School enrollment. At the same time, townspeople will be faced with a capital expenditure for the construction of a Regional Junior High School in 1967 and further prospects in 1970 for the construction of a second Elementary School in Hampden itself.

Commenting on some of the special articles contained in the 1965 warrant, the Advisory Committee recommends favorable action to Article 11, relative to the purchase of a fire truck. The growing obsolescense of the present equipment, combined with the increased construction in town creates a real need for this new apparatus. In view of the Free Cash increase noted above, it is our recommendation that the \$26,000 expenditure be made through a transfer from Free Cash rather than a tax appropriation.

We also urge the townspeople to approve a transfer from Free Cash of \$20,000 to the Stabilization Fund. This, with the preceding transfer would leave the Free Cash at \$48,200, slightly less than the figure at the beginning of January 1964.

The Advisory Committee concurs with the Selectmen in recommending the appointment of a full-time police chief and purchase of a cruiser as specified in Article 16. This step appears to us an inevitable by-product of the town expansion and although the possibility may exist for temporary alternatives, the real problem is manpower to provide full-time attention to the question of law enforcement. We further recommend that the \$12,000 involved be raised through taxation.

On Article 23 and 24 dealing with the swimming pool and play area, this Committee does not feel that this is the year in which to contemplate expenditures of this size, even though they may be realized through bonded indebtedness. Moreover, our decision is based on the fact that there does not appear to have been sufficient time and study given to the solution of this problem, to permit intelligent action at the Annual Town Meeting. We suggest the townspeople accept our motion to establish a committee to study the matter over the next year and report at the Annual Meeting in 1966.

On the basis of Advisory Committee recommendations, the total amount to be raised by taxation in 1965 would be approximately \$412,000. This would indicate a tax rate of \$34.00, two dollars more than last year.

The Committee is of the opinion that concrete long-range plans should be seriously considered so that the local government services and educational facilities can keep pace with the expected town growth. Such things as regular full-time office hours at the Town Hall, possible zoning action to prevent residential overcrowding, and the purchase of additional town land for the town for use as recreational or educational areas, are some of the steps which would lead to an orderly development of the community.

The fact that there seems to be little prospect for industrial development to relieve the individual homeowner from the entire tax burden makes it imperative that positive action be taken along these lines.

The Advisory Committee wishes to acknowledge the splendid cooperation received from all departments and extends its sincere thanks to Mrs. R. G. Schneeloch, Jr., Advisory Committee Secretary, for her faithful and conscientious service.
