

A familiar sight to Hampden residents and visitors appears on the cover of this Town Report. The remains of a dam built in 1806 by Jonathan Flynt is a reminder of the Scantic River's early source of power for manufacturing.

The first sawmill and gristmill were built on the banks of the Scantic in the mid-1700's by Lewis Langdon. Walter Burt and Jonathan Flynt each had fulling and carding mills just below a bridge erected by Mr. Flynt near the center of the village. Nearby, there were chainmakers, potash plants and paper mills. A tannery sold its products to early shoe factories in Wales and Marcus Beebe made plows which were sold primarily in the South.

A woolen mill was built in 1843 by Sumner Sessions. Other mills on the Scantic were the Hampden Mills started by Eleazer Scripter in 1858 as the Ravine Mill and the Scantic Woolen Mill, manufacturers of yarn, cloth and blankets,

The Scantic River today, in contrast to many familiar streams and rivers, has retained much of its natural beauty. Let us all make every effort to insure that this priceless asset of the Town of Hampden will be preserved for our sons and daughters.

## ANNUAL TOWN MEETING-March 2, 3, 1970

- ARTICLE 1. Voted to accept reports of officers of the Town and committees as written.
- ARTICLE 2. Voted to raise and appropriate necessary sums to cover budget for 1970 (some changes made in amounts).
- ARTICLE 3. Voted to raise and appropriate \$500. for the 1978 Centennial.
- ARTICLE 4. Denied. No bills.
- ARTICLE 5. Voted to transfer \$8,500 from Highway Machinery Fund and raise \$7,000, to be used to purchase a front end loader for Highway Dept. and to use trade-in allowance on present front end loader toward the purchase price.
- ARTICLE 6. Voted to raise \$500 to purchase a sign making machine, for use of Highway Department.
- ARTICLE 7. Voted to raise and appropriate \$3,000, to be used in conjunction with any money allotted by the State or County, or both, for Chapter 90 Maintenance.
- ARTICLE 8. Voted to raise and appropriate \$3,800. to be used in conjunction with any money allotted by the State or County for installation of storm drains on a portion of Main Street under Chapter 90, Section 34.
- ARTICLE 9. Voted to raise and appropriate \$2,200. for repair and maintenance of Town Roads under Chapter 81, Section 26.
- ARTICLE 10. Voted to borrow \$29,500. for the State share of Chapter 81 and State and County share of Chapter 90 Highway program.
- ARTICLE 11. Voted to borrow \$18,148. for construction of traffic control flow patterns at intersections of East Longmeadow Road, Allen Street and Wilbraham Road; and at intersection of Main Street and Somers Road, this sum to be reimbursed by the Commonwealth under the provisions of Chapter 519 of the Acts of 1967 and returned to the Town Treasury.
- ARTICLE 12. Voted to use State grant available in 1970 in amount of \$6,852.69 under provisions of Section 5 of Chapter 768 of Acts of 1969 for construction of traffic control flow patterns as outlined in Article 11.
- ARTICLE 13. Voted to accept a way as laid out by Selectmen on February 7, 1970: Allen Place from intersection with Allen Street south 800 feet, more or less, to its intersection with a right of way commonly known as Allen Court.
- ARTICLE 14. Voted to raise the sum of \$4,000. for widening, surfacing and drainage of Allen Place beginning at Allen Street and running south 800 feet, more or less, to its intersection with Allen Court.
- ARTICLE 15. Voted to use State grant available in 1970 in amount of \$2,284.23 under provisions of Section 4 of Chapter 768 of Acts of 1969, in conjunction with money appropriated in Article 14, for widening, surfacing and drainage of Allen Place.
- ARTICLE 16. Voted to accept a way as laid out by Selectmen on February 7, 1970, described as follows: Samble Lane from its intersection with East Longmeadow Road, a distance of 350 feet, more or less to its intersection with Deerfield Circle.
- ARTICLE 17. Voted to accept a way as laid out by Selectmen on February 7, 1970 described as Valley View Drive, from its intersection with Wilbraham Road, 2293 feet, more or less, southeasterly and including the turnaround at the end.

ARTICLE 18. Voted to accept a way as laid out by Selectmen on February 7, 1970 described as Echo Valley Drive, from its intersection with Wilbraham Road, 1203 feet, more or less, westerly and including the turnaround at the end.

ARTICLE 19. Voted to accept a way as laid out by Selectmen on February 7, 1970 described as Potash Hill Lane, from its intersection with Martin Farms Road, 1735 feet, more or less, southerly and including the turnaround at the end.

ARTICLE 20. Voted to raise the sum of \$3,000. to make drainage repairs on Potash Hill Lane.

ARTICLE 21. As amended, voted to authorize Selectmen to make application to State Dept. of Public Health to authorize a modified sanitary landfill operation at site of present town dump on Cross Road and to raise \$20,000 and transfer from Stabilization Fund \$6,500. for necessary alterations to meet standards of State Dept. of Public Health for this operation.

ARTICLE 22. As amended, voted to raise \$1,800. to install movable lower windows and screen system for 10 windows in Hampden Public Library.

ARTICLE 23. Voted to transfer from Library Fund \$580 (State Aid) for use of Library Trustees at their discretion.

ARTICLE 24. As amended, voted to raise \$1,000. as a Conservation Fund for use of Hampden Conservation Commission in obtaining appraisals, survey and a 3% appropriation toward purchase of a parcel of land owned by George Ingle.

ARTICLE 25. Voted to raise \$14,700. to pay a judgment of Hampden County Superior Court (land taking for T. Burgess School).

ARTICLE 26. Voted to accept gift of \$500 from Pat Ledoux Post 9397, Veterans of Foreign Wars, to be used by Library Trustees as they see fit for improvement of Hampden Free Public Library. Vote of thanks to this organization extended.

ARTICLE 27. As amended, voted to transfer \$3,500, from Overlay Reserve and \$8,500, from available funds to the Reserve Fund.

ARTICLE 28. Dismissed.

ARTICLE 29. Voted that \$762. dog fund be paid into the Library Account.

ARTICLE 30. Voted to authorize the Treasurer, with approval of Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of revenue for 1970 and 1971 in accordance with General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 4, and to renew notes for less than one year.

ARTICLE 31. As amended, voted that no funds be transferred (for purpose of reducing the tax rate).

ARTICLE 32. Voted to revise restrictions in Article 24 of 1969 Town Meeting warrant so funds will be available to be used in conjunction with matching funds which may become available before completion of 1971 Annual Town Meeting, through Housing Act of 1954, Title VII, Section 701.

## SPECIAL TOWN MEETING—December 30, 1970

ARTICLE 1. To see if the Town will vote to revoke the vote under Articles 11 and 12 at the last Annual Town Meeting; vote to transfer from surplus revenue \$6,852.69 (the amount of the grant referred to in said Article 12) into the Highways, Bridges and Railings account for 1970; the said grant of \$6,852.69 having been received and deposited into the Excess and Deficiency account as required by law; or take any other action in relation thereto.

Voted favorably.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from surplus revenue a sum of money to the Snow and Ice Removal account, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Voted to transfer \$3500 to Snow and Ice Removal account.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from surplus revenue a sum of money to the Veterans' Benefits account, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Voted to transfer \$1,140, to Veterans' Benefits account.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to transfer a sum of money from surplus revenue to the Reserve Fund, or take any other action in relation thereto. Voted to transfer \$2,000. to the Reserve Fund.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to purchase and/or acquire by eminent domain, under General Laws, Chapter 79, for the Conservation Commission, a parcel of land owned by one Ingle lying westerly of Mountain Road, containing about 75.92 acres, together with rights of way and other appurtenances, all as shown on a plan of subdivision of Parcel A5 (Land Court Plan #8142) drawn by Smith and Wallen Engineering Company, Inc., for Hampden Conservation Commission, certified November 4, 1970, and endorsed by Hampden Planning Board December 1, 1970; said land to be used for the promotion and development of the Town natural resources and for any of the other purposes permitted or contemplated by the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 40, Section 8C; and appropriate from available funds a sum of money for such acquisition costs or damages which may be awarded from a taking and authorize the Conservation Commission to accept State reimbursement for up to 50% of the cost of the land under the Self-Help Program of the Department of Natural Resources, General Laws, Chapter 132-A, Section 11.

Article was amended and corrected several times; ½ vote necessary; tie vote recorded, article rejected.

#### REPORT OF BOARD OF SELECTMEN

The Board held regular weekly meetings on Monday evenings during 1970, except in July and August, when an attempt was made to hold meetings on a bi-weekly basis.

All directives voted by residents at Town Meetings in 1970 have been completed with the exception of reconstructing for traffic control at the intersections of Main Street and Somers Road and Allen Street and Wilbraham Road. The voters approved a plan to use a State grant plus money to be borrowed to construct traffic control patterns at these two intersections. Our application received tentative approval by the Northampton District Office of the Mass. Department of Public Works and two corrections were made and approved to the original layout, Much to our surprise, final approval was denied by the Mass. Dept. of Public Works because there had not been a sufficient number of accidents at these locations to justify the proposed corrections. An appeal based upon the fact that the Selectmen were attempting to create safer intersections and eliminate accident statistics was also denied. Traffic control within the Commonwealth appears to be based upon blood and tears.

Reconstruction has been completed on Martin Farms Road, Potash Hill Lane, Chapin Road, and preliminary widening of Cross Road. Allen Place was accepted and constructed according to town specifications. Drainage work has been completed on a portion of Chapin Road and South Monson Road. It is anticipated Chapter 90 drainage and resurfacing of Main Street from North Road to the entrance to the Recreation Field will be completed this year.

A Michigan diesel front end loader was purchased for the highway department and has proved to be a versatile piece of equipment. It is necessary to replace a 1958 Brockway dump truck this year. The Selectmen and Highway Superintendent did not expect this truck to continue on until Town Meeting time. Article 12 in the Warrant is asking for a sum of money to reconstruct Wilbraham Road from Allen Street to a point beyond the Thornton Burgess School with town funds. The Board of Selectmen are well aware of all drainage and highway conditions within the town, and are attempting to stretch each dollar and ask for only the real necessities to assist in maintaining an acceptable tax rate. We are confident residents realize that some town streets and roads have been neglected because the highway department budget has not kept pace on a percentage increase basis with other departments. However, we must also realize that streets and highways must have scheduled maintenance to prevent costly resurfacing or reconstruction. The financing of Chapter 81 and Chapter 90 programs, plus use of special grants is becoming more complex each year. Due to delays in receiving State and County funds, towns are being forced to borrow and renew notes, which create unforeseen interest charges.

The sanitary landfill has been completed and the waste disposal program is working well. Complete compacting and covering according to specifications has completely eliminated all previous problems at the disposal area. The Selectmen are asking for the cooperation of all citizens to assist in keeping this landfill operation as clean and efficient as possible. Cooperation and management will determine whether or not the use of this site can be stretched to ten years. More efficient operation and regulations of no outside burning after July 1, 1971 by the Pioneer Valley Pollution Control Commission are the basis for the article in the town warrant for trash and garbage curbside bi-weekly pickup. Sewage disposal is now and will become a greater problem in the next few years. A committee has been selected and is working earnestly and diligently to submit a recommendation by Annual Town Meeting time.

The Selectmen are pleased and feel the town is fortunate in having the opportunity to secure the parcel of land from Miss Gertrude Lyons which abuts the highway garage, fire department and the Town House. The securing of this area will beautify the Town complex and provide a parking area for future growth.

A Housing for the Elderly Study Committee under the able leadership of Charles P. Sharples is keeping abreast of the need for this type of facility in Hampden. Two liquor licenses were granted in 1970; one all alcoholic to Center Package Store and one beer and wine to Laughing Brook Gourmet Shop.

Street lighting was surveyed and several new lights were installed. Lighting at intersections received the priority from this survey. Application to the Mass. Dept. of Public Works for no parking from 477 Main Street to the intersection of Glendale and Scantic Roads was approved. This is in the vicinity of the Mass. Audubon Society Laughing Brook Sanctuary and will eliminate a dangerous situation on their busy days. Dogs, public health conditions, pollution control and mosquito control methods continue to occupy the minds of those concerned.

The Board of Selectmen has participated in many conferences or meetings with Selectmen of other towns, neighboring city officials, county officials for Hall of Justice site selection, proposed electric rate increases, air pollution control, and many other community related actions.

The Board regrets to announce it became necessary to appoint an Acting Town Counsel, due to the illness of Attorney William Canfield. Bill Canfield has served well and long and we wish him a speedy return to health. In the interim, Attorney Joseph P. Jennings is Acting Town Counsel. The Board wishes to acknowledge the resignation of Paul D. Hunter as Selectman. The Board made a real attempt to have Paul remain on the Board for the remainder of his term, but the pressure of business finally won out.

Town government thrives on cooperation. Hampden is an enviable town because of its community spirit and community minded officials and townspeople. The Selectmen are grateful for the cooperation of all town officials and community minded citizens during the year 1970. Hampden can maintain its country atmosphere and country tax rate without being backward.

The Selectmen are directly responsible for many of the services to the town such as health, highways, police and fire. Hampden can be progressive and still enjoy an acceptable tax structure if we do not demand city service. A slight inconvenience now and then can make the difference of a few dollars on our tax bill.

The demand for service will occur in a natural manner. Super service can be controlled.

#### REPORT OF POLICE DEPARTMENT

The following is a report of the Police Department for the year 1970. During 1970 the Police Department received over 8,570 calls on the police lines for assistance and reporting crimes of various nature. This was an increase of 1,500 calls over last year's record 7,000 calls. We saw an increase in the national crime rate and our own crime rate increased 55% with house breaks and larcenies heading the list.

There was a large increase in the accident totals with 88 for 1970 as opposed to 54 for 1969. There were two fatal accidents during the year. We have charted the high rate areas and are working speed traps in these areas to lower the accident rate. You will note there were 289 violations issued—an increase of 89 motor vehicle violations over last year. We will continue the procedure until we actually reduce the accident rate.

There were 2,250 house checks made during the year, an increase of over 50% from last year and with the increase of Breaking and Entering in the greater Springfield area we expect a larger number of house checks in 1971.

We are fast approaching, if we have not already passed, the time for a full time Police Department with a cruiser on the road 24 hours a day. I urge your careful consideration of this fact.

Both Officer Stone and I continued courses at Springfield College this year and are happy to report we have received another Federal Grant to continue our education for 1971.

We worked with the Conservation Commission on the continuing task of having junk cars removed and we thank them for their time and effort in this endeavor.

Below you will find a list of arrests for 1970 and you will note an increase of 113 cases over last year which required several hundred hours of investigation and court time.

The Auxiliary Police Department had another full year assisting the regular officers with night and weekend patrols. They worked many extra hours to help out when needed. They continued their regular training sessions with guest speakers and instructors and are now actively engaged in a 10 session Law Enforcement Training Project conducted and produced by the Justice Department, Office of Law Enforcement Assistance, Washington, D.C.

Listed below is a breakdown of the man hours donated by the Auxiliary Police to the town during 1970.

To these men who give their time and effort without compensation, who have great pride in their organization and great public spirit, I say thank you for a job well done. Without your capable assistance, we would not be able to function as a capable Police Department.

During 1970 the Police Department issued 73 pistol permits, 42 Firearms I.D. cards, 1 gun dealer's license, 1 junk car permit and 34 copies of accident reports for a total of \$390.00 in fees which were turned over to the Town Treasurer.

I would like to express a special thanks to the Harris Ambulance Service for their fine cooperation and service given over the past years. It is a great comfort to know that these efficient and capable men and women with their equipment are available when needed.

I sincerely thank the several department heads and the Board of Selectmen for their cooperation during this year.

#### REPORT OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

During the year 1970 the Hampden Volunteer Fire Department responded to 52 calls:

There were some unforeseen breakdowns during the year. In the early spring the pump in the well at the Fire Station had to be replaced. To pay for this, it was necessary to obtain a transfer of funds. We also had to replace the motor in our 1937 Ford pumper; also the siren motor located at the Highway Department garage had to be replaced. These were paid for out of our budget, using money that was budgeted for other expenses.

The operation of the Town dump as a sanitary landfill operation has eliminated one of the Fire Department's most frequent problems. The ban imposed on the burning of leaves last fall was the major factor in the decrease in grass fires during the fall season.

The members of the Fire Department continue to take an active part in the Hampden County Fire Mutual Aid Association. As well as answering all alarms, the members also attend a monthly business meeting and a monthly training session.

I would like to thank every member of the Fire Department who gives unselfishly of his time and effort for the protection of life and property in the town. Also a thank you to the Board of Selectmen for their cooperation during the year.

#### REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH

There has been a demonstrable increase in public interest in the subject of environmental improvement.

The general uneasiness was reflected in the many complaints investigated and resolved with the cooperation of the Board of Selectmen and the Town's residents.

During the year the enforcement of the State Public Health codes, for the benefit of the Town resulted in:

- 2 condemnations of existing dwellings.
- 1 demolition of a nuisance.
- 1 septic tank installer's permit was withdrawn for repeated failure to comply with local and State regulations.
- 1 septic tank installation (new construction) permit was denied, for failure to comply with State regulations.
- 3 septic tank installations (new construction) permits were denied, due to poor soil conditions, based on percolation testing.
- 6 concerns were granted permits to pump septic tanks.
- 1 food service establishment was approved and issued a permit.
- To eliminate the nuisance complaints of the Town disposal area, a sanitary landfill operation was instituted and approved by the State Department of Public Health.

In conclusion, I am appreciative of the continued cooperation of the Board and their administrative assistant, Mrs. Ruth Woods.
