always questions to be resolved, of course, and we will continue to work on them. The Police need a

modern computer system and equipment needs for Highway, Police and Fire Departments are always in

the forefront. We also, of course, continue to try to operate the town budget with very limited increases.

It is important that you be informed at Town Meeting. Please attend the Advisory Budget Hearing on

March 13, 1995 in the Town House auditorium. This is your opportunity to help us with our

recommendations.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate and/or transfer from available funds a sum of money to purchase a police department computer management system, or take any other action relative thereto.

FIRE DEPARTMENT RADIO SYSTEM

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate and/or transfer from available funds a sum of money to upgrade existing radio/pager system and install new antenna for the volunteer fire department, or take any other action relative thereto.

ACCESSORY

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Bylaw as follows:

Add to Section 7.3 the following:

with the following exceptions:

- 7.3.1 Any building less than 170 sq.ft. in area and less than 12 feet in height shall be subject to minimum side and raer set-back distances of twelve (12) feet.
- 7.3.2 Any building less than 25 sq.ft. in area and less than 6 feet in height shall be subject to minimum side and rear set-back distances of 5 feet.
- 7.3.3 Note (3) to Chart 7.2 applies, and the total area of buildings under 7.3.1 and 7.3.2 shall not exceed 200 sq.ft.

ZONING BYLAW DEFINITION

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Bylaw as follows:

Inserting in Chart 7.2, Note (1) after the words "...which is on a turning radius", the words "of less than 250 feet".

SIGNS

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Bylaw as follows:

Delete Section 7.6.2.1.3 and 7.6.2.1.4 in their entirety and renumber the following subsections, 7.6.2.1.5 - 7, accordingly.

Add the following language to Section 7.6.2.1.1: "If the premises has frontage on two streets, one (1) such sign may be used to face each street."

Replace Section 7.6.2.1.2 with the following: "Signs attached to the primary buildings may not project toward the street more than two (2) feet from the building and may not exceed three (3) feet in height from the base of the sign to the top of the sign and total sign area may not exceed ten percent (10%) of the wall area of the building fronting on the street. The top of such sign shall not extend above the parapet line in a flat roofed building, nor above the ridge line on a pitched roof building. In calculating sign area under the foregoing, temporary sign attached to store fronts and window glass shall not be considered, but these temporary signs shall cover no more than twenty percent (20%) of the window glass area of the building.", or take any other action relative thereto.

& WETLANDS DISTRICT

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning By-laws as follows:

Section 6.7

To replace in its entirety with the following: 6.7 Flood Plain and Wetland Districts

- 1. The purpose of these Districts are:
 - 1. To provide that the lands in the Town of Hampden subject to seasonal or periodic flooding as described hereinafter shall not be used or other purpose in such a manner as to endanger the health or safety of the occupants thereof.

- 2. To protect, preserve and maintain the water table and water recharge areas within the Town so as to preserve present and potential water supplies for the public and safety of the Town of Hampden.
- 3. To assure the continuation of the natural flow pattern of the water course (s) within the Town of Hampden in order to provide adequate and safe flood water storage capacity to protect persons and property against the hazards of flood inundation.
- 2. Floodplain District Boundaries and Base Flood Elevation and Floodway Data
 - The Floodplain District is herein established as an overlay district. The district includes all special flood hazard areas designated on the Town of Hampden Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) issued by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) for the administration of the NFIP dated (FIRM date) as zone A, AE, AH, AO, A1-30, A99, V, V1-30, VE, and the FEMA Flood boundary and Floodway Map dated (Floodway Map Date), both maps which indicate the 100-year regulatory floodplain. The exact boundaries of the district may be defined by the 100 year base flood elevations shown on the FIRM and further defined by the Flood Insurance study booklet dated (FIS date). The FIRM, Floodway Maps, Flood Insurance study booklet are incorporated herein by reference and are on file with the Town Clerk, Planning Board, Building Inspector, and Conservation Commission.
 - 2. In Zone A, A1-30 and AE, along watercourses that have not had a regulatory floodway designated, the best available Federal, State, Local or other floodway data shall be used to prohibit encroachments in floodways which would result in any increase in flood levels within the community during the occurrence of the base flood discharge.

4. Use Regulations

1. The Floodplain District is established as an overlay district to all other districts. All development in the district, including structural and non-structural activities, whether permitted by right or special permit, must be in compliance with Chapter 131, Section 40 of the Massachusetts General Laws and with the following:

Section of the Massachusetts State Building Code which addresses floodplain areas - currently 780 CMR 2102.0 "Flood Resistant Construction":

Wetlands Protection Regulations - currently 310 CMR 10.00;

Inland Wetlands Restriction - currently 302 CMR 6.0;

Minimum Requirements for the Subsurface Disposal of San tary Sewage, currently 310 CMR 15, Title 5;

Any Variances from the provisions and requirements of the state regulations referenced above may only be granted in accordance with the required variance procedures of these State regulations.

2. In the Wetland District, and in the Flood Plain outside of the Designated Floodway (see 6.7.2.3.), no new buildings other than accessory buildings may be erected or constructed. Construction of accessory buildings in the Flood Plain shall be allowed only so long as they re anchored to prevent flotation and lateral movement, and are constructed with flood-resistant materials and methods, as determined by

the Building Inspector in conformance with the State Building Code. Additionally, no dumping, filling, or transfer or relocation shall be permitted in the above mentioned districts, nor shall any land, building, or structure be used for any purpose except:

- 1. Outdoor recreation, including play areas, nature study, boating, fishing, and hunting where legally permitted, but excluding buildings and structures.
- 2. Non-commercial signs (as permitted in the Residential District), foot, bicycle, and/or horse paths and bridges, and wildlife management areas, provided such use does not affect the natural flow pattern on any watercourse.
- 3. Grazing and farming, including truck gardening and harvesting of crops.
- Forestry and nurseries.
- 5. Conservation of water, plants, and wildlife
- 6. Dwellings and other structures and uses lawfully existing prior to the adoption of these provisions, but not including substantial improvements as defined in the National Flood Insurance Program's Rules and Regulations published in the Federal Register of October 26, 1976.
- 7. Other uses and structures within the Wetland and Flood Plain outside of the Designated Floodway, by special permission from the Board of Appeals subject to the following:
 - All proposals for special permits must have been referred to the Planning Board, the Board of Health, and the

to assure that: a) such proposals minimize flood damage; b) all public utilities and facilities are located and constructed to minimize or damage; and c)adequate drainage is provided to reduce exposure to flood hazards. The proposals must be reported favorably by two of the three boards. If the boards fail to act upon the proposal or fail to notify the Town Clerk and the applicant of their action within forty-five days after its submission, the proposal shall be deemed approved, and the Town Clerk shall issue a certificate to the same effect.

- 2. The proposed use will not be detrimental to the public health, safety and welfare.
- 3. All proposed new construction in the Flood Plain must be in conformance with the regulations as referenced in section 6.7.4.1 of this bylaw as determined by the Building Inspector.
- 4. In the Flood Plain all subdivision proposals and other proposed new developments greater than fifty (50) lots of five (5) acres, whichever is less, must include base flood elevation data.
- All new water systems must be located and designed so as to avoid impairment due to flooding.
- 6. Within Zones A1-30, all new construction and substantial improvements (the cost of which equals or exceeds fifty percent of the market value of the structure) of residential and

non-residential structures shall conform to the regulations as referenced in section 6.7.4.1 of this bylaw.

- 7. Within Zone A (un-numbered A zone), where the base flood elevation is not provided on the Flood insurance Rate Map, the applicant shall produce the best available Federal, State, local or other floodway data which shall be used to ensure conformance to the State building Code Section 2102.0. In cases where date is not available the Wetlands Protection Act may require engineering studies to be performed in order to determine base flood elevations in unnumbered A zones
- 8. Where watertight floodproofing of a structure is permitted in lieu of elevation, a registered professional engineer or architect shall certify to the building inspector that the methods used are in conformance with the regulations as referenced in Section 6.7.4.1 of this bylaw.
- 9. The proposed use must comply in all other respects to the provisions of the underlying District or Districts within which the land is located.
- 3. Within the designated floodway, no encroachments, including fill, new construction, substantial improvements and other development shall be permitted unless a technical evaluation demonstrates that said encroachment shall not result in any increase in flood levels during occurrence of the base flood discharge. In granting variances or special permit for use in the designated floodway, the Board of Appeals:

- 1. Must be shown good and sufficient cause.
- 2. Must be shown that failure to grant the variance or special permit would result in exceptional hardship to the applicant.
- 3. Must be shown that the granting of said variance or special permit will not result in increased flood heights, additional threats to the public safety, extraordinary public expense, the creation of nuisances, or conflict with existing laws or ordinances.
- 4. Must be assured that all other applicable Flood Plain management requirements (see Section 6.7.2.2.7) will be met.
- 4. The portion of any lot within the area delineated on the Hampden Zoning Map as Flood Plain and Wetland district or other existing wetland as defined by M.G.L. Chapter 131, Section 40, may be used to meet the area and yard requirements for the district or districts in which the remainder of the lot is situated (provided the proposed construction site be a non-wetland or non-flood plain area of at least 75% of the minimum lot area requirements).
- 5. Where the bounds are in doubt, the burden of proof shall be on the owner(s) of the land in question, to show where they should be properly located. However, the Town of Hampden retains its authority to determine the actual boundaries of the flood plain/wetland within the area in question, or take any other action relative thereto.
